

Grant Funding Received for Crocker Park Trail

Have you taken a stroll along Crocker Park Trail before? It's a 2.25 mile existing former railroad right-of-way located in the Industrial Park, passing directly behind many of the businesses along Valley Drive, the "spine" of the industrial park. The trailhead is located on Park Lane directly across the street from the Dog Park and adjacent to the Purcell Murray business. There are also five street intersections where you can hop onto the trail, designated by the green dots on the map above.

The City recently applied for and were recommended to receive grant funding from the federally funded One Bay Area Grant Cycle 2 (OBAG 2) to install stabilized decomposed granite surfacing over the railroad ballast rock to make the trail passable to pedestrian and bicycle commuters/users, including those using wheeled transportation and parents with strollers.

Project criteria included proximity to a Planned Development Area (PDA), as designated by the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG), the regional planning agency that is complementary to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission or MTC (who administers the federal grant for our area), and location of a project in or in close proximity to a Priority Development Area (PDA) with affordable housing

preservation strategies. Project selection for our county was administered by C/CAG (City/County Association of Governments). At first, the C/CAG Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee recommended not funding the Crocker Trail project, but Brisbane Councilmember Cliff Lentz made an appeal to the C/CAG Board to fund the project despite the recommendation, with the information that Brisbane's

Parkside Precise Plan (which plans for 228 units) would very likely be adopted by Council this year, and that the Plan will also meet the city's RHNA allocation for affordable housing sites.



Deputy Public Works Director Karen Kinser presented information about the project to the C/CAG Board at their March 9th meeting, and how it meets many of the funding criteria. Also in attendance at that meeting were Lipman Middle School's Safe Routes to Schools Program Manager Michelle

Chan, Brisbane Parks and Recreation Commissioner Renee Marmion, and a representative from the Silicon Valley Bicycle Coalition, who all spoke in favor of the project. For instance, Michelle Chan spoke about how an improved path would provide a safe connection between a residential development (Landmark and Altamar subdivisions of the Northeast Ridge) and Lipman Middle School, where a low percentage of students currently walk or bike. In the end, a majority of the C/CAG Board voted to fund the project for \$885,300 (total


estimated cost of the project is \$1,000,000).

The improved path will facilitate short trips from residential areas to the center of town and activity centers, such as parks, the library, transit stops, and future development in the Priority Development Area. The funding process will allow for construction to take place in the coming year. Kudos to all those involved in the city receiving this funding and for improvements to Crocker Park Trail able to take place!

Meet Brisbane Village Helping Hand Volunteer Paul Bouscal

When Paul Bouscal moved to Brisbane in 1983, he was struck by the small-town feel and strong sense of community he encountered.

"In other towns and cities, you have neighborhoods," he explains. "But in this town there is like just one big neighborhood. I liked that."

He also liked the idea of a "village" that would connect volunteers in the community with older residents who need a helping hand. When he heard that Brisbane residents were planning to form such a "village" he thought it would definitely add to the neighborhood feeling. And he was right.

After Brisbane Village Helping Hands (BVHH) launched in March 2016, he decided to become a volunteer. Since then he has assisted BVHH members needing small repairs or help with tasks at home, such as hanging curtains, moving a large box

from someone's driveway to their backyard (with the help of a second volunteer) and helping move a large bookcase for a village member recovering from surgery.

"Helping others makes me feel good," says Bouscal. "There is a lot of appreciation. The resident that I moved the box for was so grateful. He said he needed help, but didn't want a 'stranger' offering assistance. He wanted someone he could trust, and he felt reassured because all volunteers in the Village are vetted, meaning they undergo a background check."

Bouscal likes the flexibility that BVHH offers, so volunteers are notified of opportunities by email, and he can accept requests based on his availability.

"I work full time, so it helps that I can volunteer according to my own schedule," he says,

Bouscal has worked for the San Francisco Water Department for 30 years and before that, he was a member of the Brisbane Fire Department. He lives in town with his wife, Kathryn. He has two daughters, two stepsons, plus five grand-children and one on the way.

He is a longtime volunteer in Brisbane, and BVHH is just one of the organizations he is involved with. As a longtime board member and the vice president of San Bruno Mountain Watch, he leads hikes on San Bruno Mountain for school children and adults. During these educational outings, he points out native plants and wildlife to hikers. He and other



volunteers created a 4000-square-foor "native plant nursery" near the Brisbane firehouse and he is working with secondand third-graders at Brisbane Elementary School to create a native plant vegetable garden at the school.

BVHH Board President Nancy Colman is very appreciative he has made time for BVHH.

"Paul was Brisbane's volunteer of the year in 2015, and we feel very lucky to have such a stellar volunteer joining BVHH when he is already so busy helping others," she says. "And I know that the people he has helped are very appreciative."

Steve Goodwin, for example, asked BVHH for someone to help move a bookcase when he was recovering from surgery. Paul accepted the request and gave him a hand.

"I really appreciated it," says Goodwin. "We're lucky to live in a town where neighbors are willing to take the time to help each other, and also that we have people willing to organize the logistics of such an endeavor, so that people who need assistance can be matched with those who can help."

While Bouscal helps with home repairs, BVHH also provides assistance to seniors in the areas of transportation, technology, companionship and more. Social events are also scheduled.




