A Small Family Child Care Home is:

- > Child care provided by a care giver in his / her own home.
- > Licensed for up to 6-8 children under the age of 10 (including the providers' own children).
- > Licensed by the State of California Department of Social Services (DSS).

No permit is required by the City. Allowed by right in any residence in the State of California.

A Large Family Child Care Home is:

- > Child care provided by a care giver in his / her own home.
- > Licensed for up to 12-14 children under the age of 10 (including the providers' own children).
- > Licensed by the State of California Department of Social Services (DSS).

No permit is required by the City. Allowed by right in any residence in the State of California.

A Child Care Center is:

- > Child care provided by qualified teachers in a licensed facility.
- > Space requirements include 35 sq.ft. of classroom space per child indoors and 75 sq.ft. per child outdoors.
- > Licensed by the State of California Department of Social Services (DSS).

A Child Care Center requires a State license and a CUP*

Up to 12-14 children depending on age

Put plans together to modify home if necessary to meet requirements



Have a large family child care home inspected by: 1) City Fire Marshal / Inspector 2) State Licensing Evaluator

Child Care Center

Planning Process

- Review City permit requirements with Planning staff (preliminary ARB** review may be recommended for certain sites)
- Prepare concept development plan for a determined site
- Attend orientation meetings with State licensing
- Meet with City Planning, Building, Fire, & Public Works Engineering staff to review site plan, land use, facilities, and operations
- Submit applications for CUP* and ARB** review (fee required)
- Within 30 days, Planning staff coordinates City departments' comments & notifies applicant of any deficiencies
- Prepare any plan revisions if required
- Prepare for public hearings before ARB** & Director's Hearing
- Director's decision is appealable



Building Process

- Consult with the State license to review final concept plans
- Submit building plans to City Building department for review with a permit application (fee required)
- City departments review building plans (this process may take several months)
- Approval / issuance of building permit Development impact fees due
- Begin construction
- 30 days prior to the issuance of occupancy permits, contact State
 Community Care Licensing to begin licensing process
- Complete and submit State licensing application to DSS
- To obtain occupancy permits, call for final inspection:
 - 1) City Building Inspector
 - 2) City Fire Marshal
 - 3) State Licensing Evaluator
- Obtain State license from Department of Social Services prior to opening
