Stanford University supports the professional and academic development of postdoctoral trainees through a dedicated Office of Postdoctoral Affairs, two career centers, and a multitude of programs offered by those entities and others on campus.

The Office of Postdoctoral Affairs (OPA) at Stanford University oversees, develops and manages policies related to all postdoctoral scholars at Stanford; offers educational programs and services to postdoctoral scholars; and collaborates with university organizations, faculty, postdocs, their administrators and external entities to support the training, personal growth, and professional development of each postdoc in preparation for an independent career. Programs offered through OPA include but are not limited to:

- Scientific Management Series (SMS) Introduction to laboratory and research management skills critical for productive independent careers in academic and other settings.
