Palo Alto Utilities Sends Aid to Northern California Fire Victims

Electric Crews Dispatched to Help Restore Power at Fire-Damaged Facilities

Palo Alto, CA – September 25, 2015 –This week, the City of Palo Alto Utilities (CPAU) dispatched electric utility crews to the Northern California wildland fire area. CPAU Electric Operations staff will help restore power where major transmission lines, power poles, power plants and generating facilities have been severely damaged.

Some of the power plants, major electric transmission and distribution lines, and electricity generating facilities operated by the Northern California Power Agency (NCPA), of which the City is a member, have been impacted. As part of a mutual aid agreement under NCPA, five staff members from CPAU Electric Operations departed Wednesday for Healdsburg to provide assistance. They are expected to be there approximately five days, framing and setting poles to allow the restringing of electric wire. CPAU is also awaiting delivery of another vehicle to assist with restoration efforts. Once it arrives, a second crew of three more CPAU Electric Operations staff will depart for the area.

Earlier this month, the City of Palo Alto deployed two fire engines and crews as a part of the two separate Santa Clara County Strike Teams to help battle both the Butte and Valley Fires. The fire crews worked 24-hour rotations to help contain the fires, search for missing persons and protect homes. CalFire has since released both units back to Palo Alto. The City backfilled both fire crews with off duty staffing and used reserve fire engines to ensure continuity of operations for Palo Alto and Stanford while the crews were deployed.

The combined acreage of the two fires is more than 200 square miles. By comparison, the City of Palo Alto is almost 26 square miles. Thousands of homes, businesses and significant community infrastructure have been destroyed and more than 6,400 firefighters have been assigned to these fires.

We thank the CPAU and Fire Department staff for their service to our greater Northern California community, and look forward to the safe return of our CPAU Electric Operations staff.


