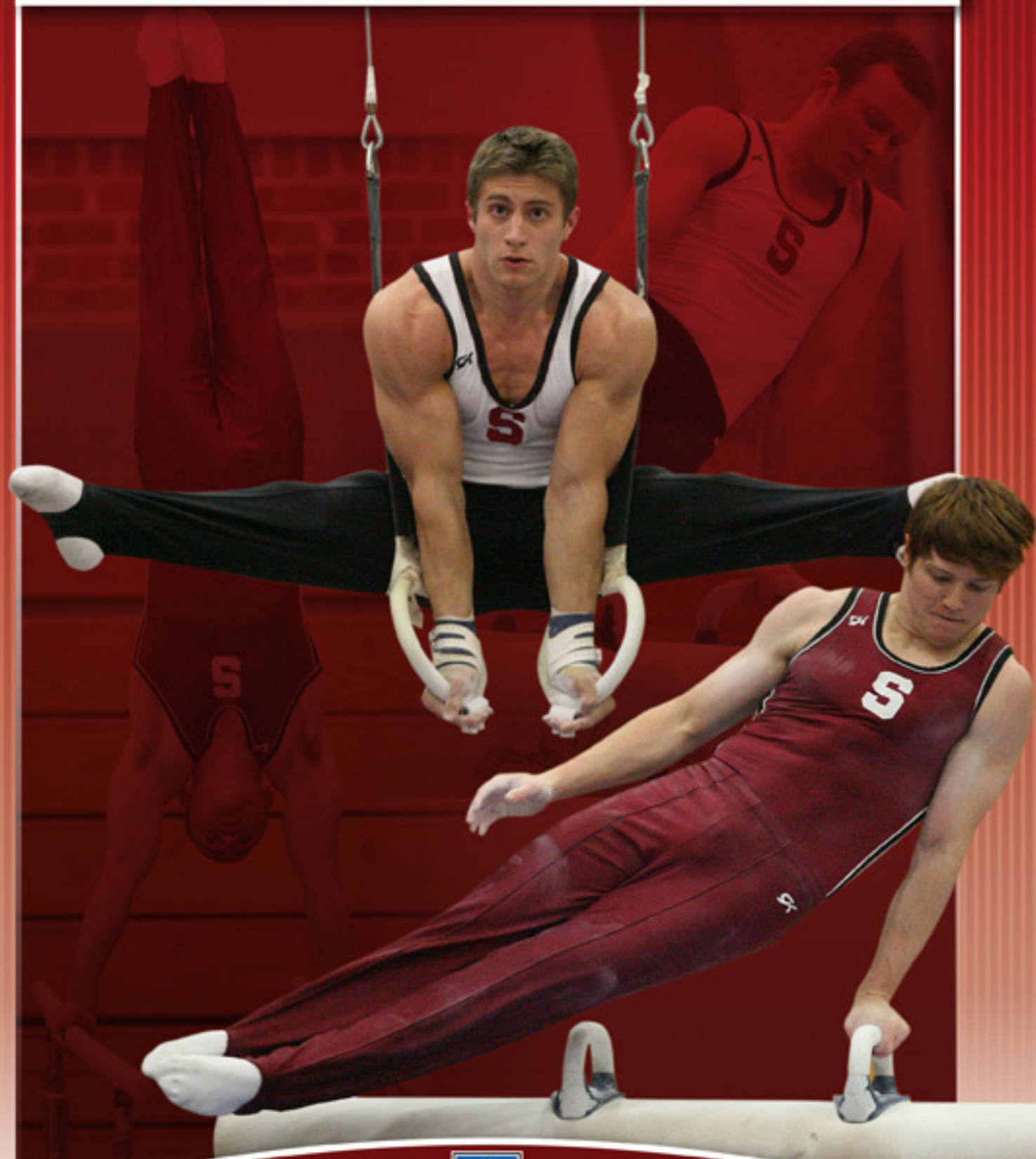

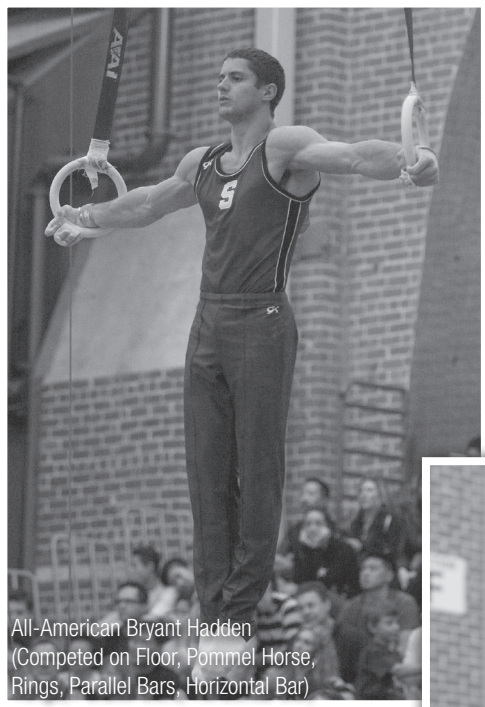
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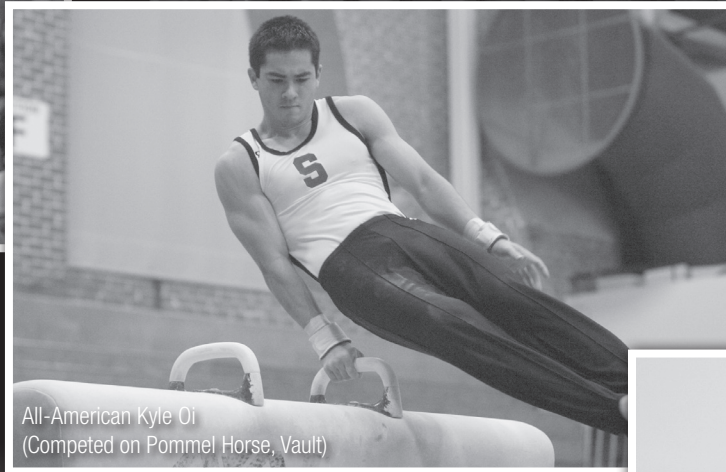


S 2009 NCAA CHAMPIONS

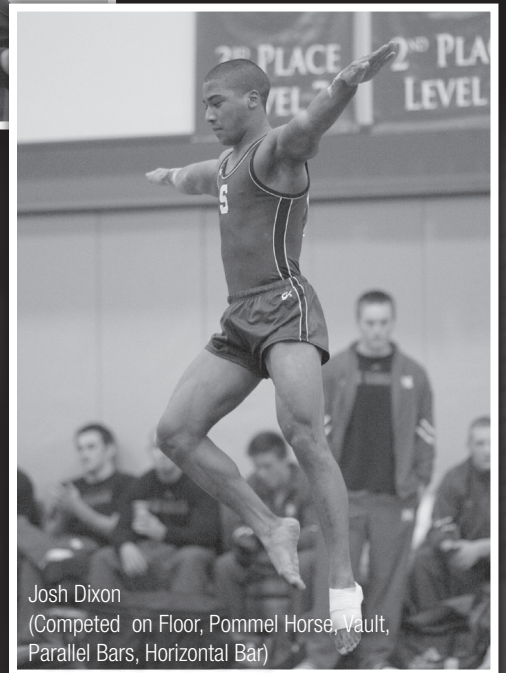
The 2009 Stanford men's gymnastics team captured the NCAA Championship, the fourth in team history. It was the first national title since 1995 and the first under head coach Thom Glielmi. Stanford totaled 362.8 points to win by just over a point. It was the culmination of a program that has been rebuilt to the top of the sport by Glielmi and his staff. The Cardinal will now face an ever greater challenge, staying on top!

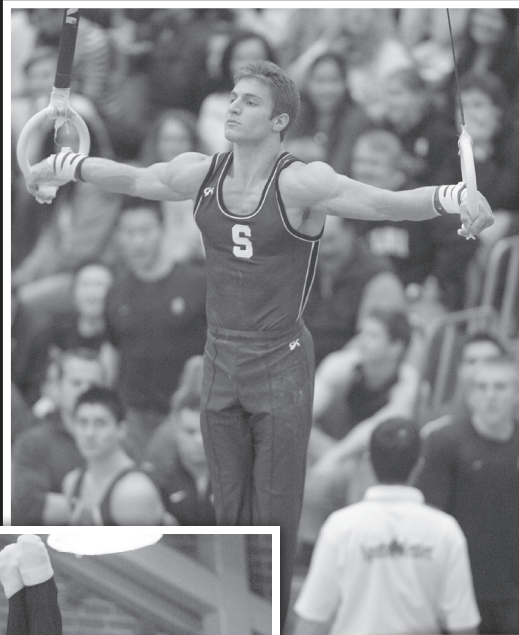

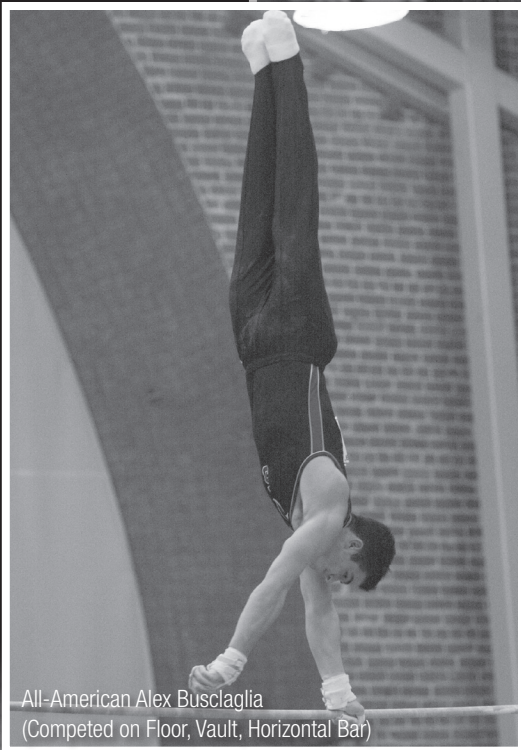

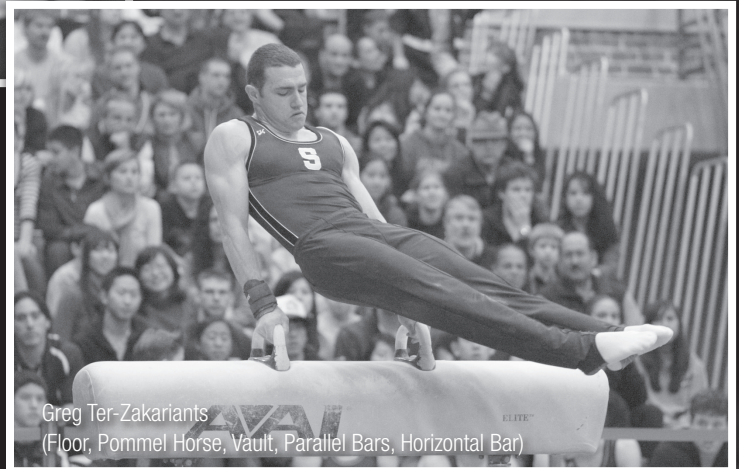

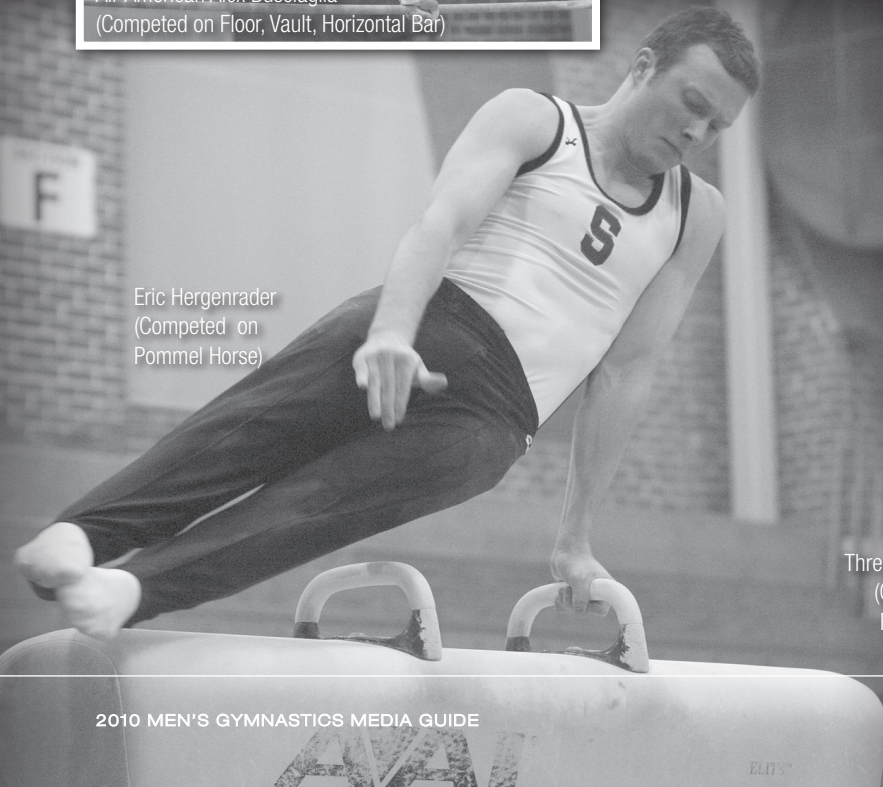

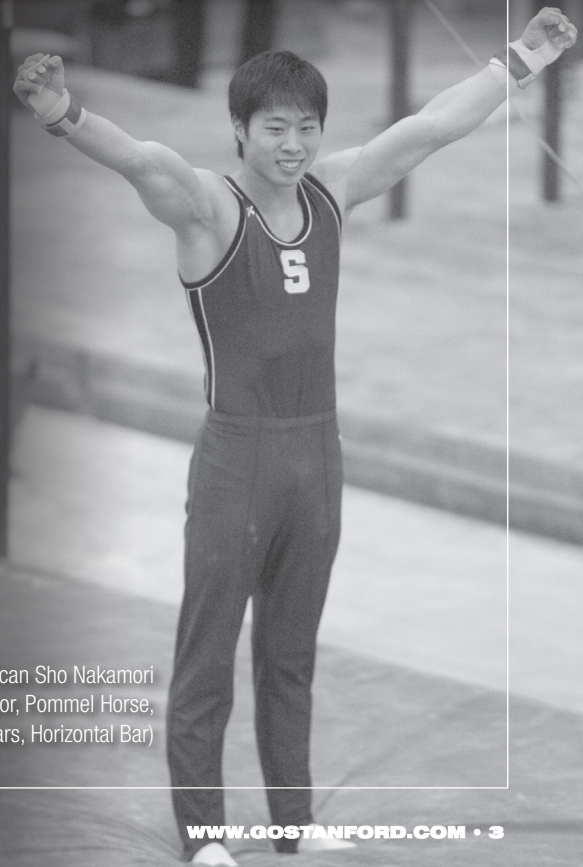

Stanford Looks To Repeat

After coming agonizingly close to a national title in both 2007 and 2008, Stanford broke through in 2009 to win the NCAA championship, the fourth in school history, and the first under head coach Thom Glielmi. The Cardinal are hoping for a repeat performance in 2010. The Stanford men appear in good shape for a run at another title with several key returners and a group of talented newcomers. Experts agree as the Cardinal enter the season with a No. 1 national preseason ranking.

"I think our scoring potential is greater this year than last year," said Glielmi. "Our top four in each event has increased their difficulty and once our fifth and sixths are ironed out we will have good depth."

Stanford will undoubtedly miss eight-time All-American and Team U.S.A. competitor, Sho Nakamori. Nakamori earned three All-America honors in 2009 and was Stanford's top competitor in the all-around as well as three individual events. In addition, Bryant Hadden and Jason Shen were lost to graduation. Hadden was the Card's top scorer on rings in 2009 and an All-American in the event.

Despite the losses, Stanford still returns six different athletes who earned All-America honors in 2009. This group includes Tim Gentry and Nick Noone, who were both All-Americans in multiple events. The reigning national coach of the year, Glielmi, also brought in a talented recruiting class with the capability of contributing right away.

"I think we are very strong in every event," said Glielmi. "We should be very solid on floor, pommel horse and rings with are greatest potential to really pull ahead of some teams on vault."

▼ Floor Exercise

The Cardinal return two standouts on the floor, senior Greg Ter-Zakariants and junior Josh Dixon. Ter-Zakariants was an All-American in the event in 2008 and qualified through to the NCAA Event Finals in 2009. Dixon was the top scorer in the event in 2009 and won the MPSF title. His 15.9 at the MPSF meet was also a school record. Juniors Alex Buscaglia, Gentry and Ryan Lieberman have also produced results on the floor and will vie for spots in the lineup. Joining this group is freshman Eddie Penev, a Junior Olympic national champion and a 2009 European Championships finalist in the event for Bulgaria. Also looking to break into the lineup is redshirt junior Abhinav Ramani once he returns from a preseason broken hand.

▼ Pommel Horse

Returning for Stanford on the pommel horse are Dixon, Eric Hergenrader, Kyle Oi and Ter-Zakariants. Each of Oi, Ter-Zakariants and Dixon competed in the event last season at the NCAA Finals. Hergenrader earned his career-best score of 14.55 at the MPSF Championships. Joining this group are redshirt junior Lucas Hughes and sophomores Gabriel Alvarado, John Martin, Jordan Nolf and Ramani who have shown promise on this apparatus.

▼ Still Rings

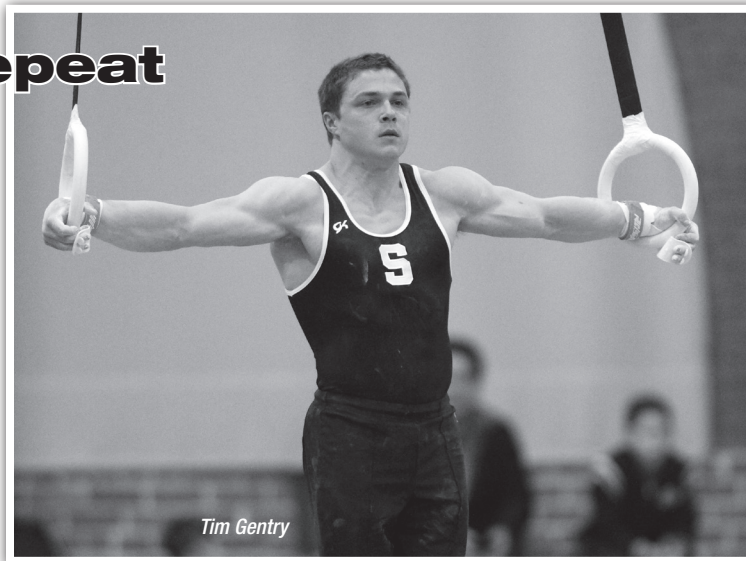
The Cardinal should be stacked on rings with three returning All-Americans and several other strong competitors. Last year Noone finished third, Gentry finished fourth and Oi finished seventh at the NCAA Individuals for Stanford. Both Gentry and Noone have recorded scores of 15.45, while Oi has a 15.3 to his credit. Also returning is Lieberman who competed at the NCAA Finals in the event, scoring a 14.85. Joining this deep group will be Nolf and freshman James Fosco, who specializes on rings and could be a force in the event right away.

▼ Vault

Stanford will again be strong on vault, led by returning All-American Gentry. He and Dixon posted scores of 16.4 in 2009, along with Buscaglia who had a 16.05 and Ter-Zakariants, who had a 16.0, the Cardinal boast four returners who hit the 16-point barrier. Other capable returners are Lieberman and Oi who both competed at the NCAA Finals in the event. Penev and Jason Stevens lead the freshmen who could contribute for Stanford on one of its deepest events.

▼ Parallel Bars

Stanford will miss Nakamori on parallel bars, perhaps his best event. However, the Cardinal returns two other All-Americans in Lieberman and Noone. Lieberman tied for fifth and Noone finished seventh at the 2009 NCAA Individuals. Dixon and Ter-Zakariants

both competed in the event at the NCAA Finals last year. Looking to break into the lineup are Buscaglia and sophomore Cameron Foreman. Freshman Benjamin Rudolph also has the difficulty in his routine to be a factor.

▼ Horizontal Bar

The Cardinal return Buscaglia, an All-American in the event in 2009. Joining Buscaglia in the lineup should be Dixon and Ter-Zakariants, who posted a scores over 15 in 2009 and competed in the event at the NCAA Finals. Gentry and Lieberman also have the experience in the event to step in. Joining this established group are returners Foreman and Ramani and freshman Paul Hichwa who are looking to make the NCAA lineup.

▼ All-Around

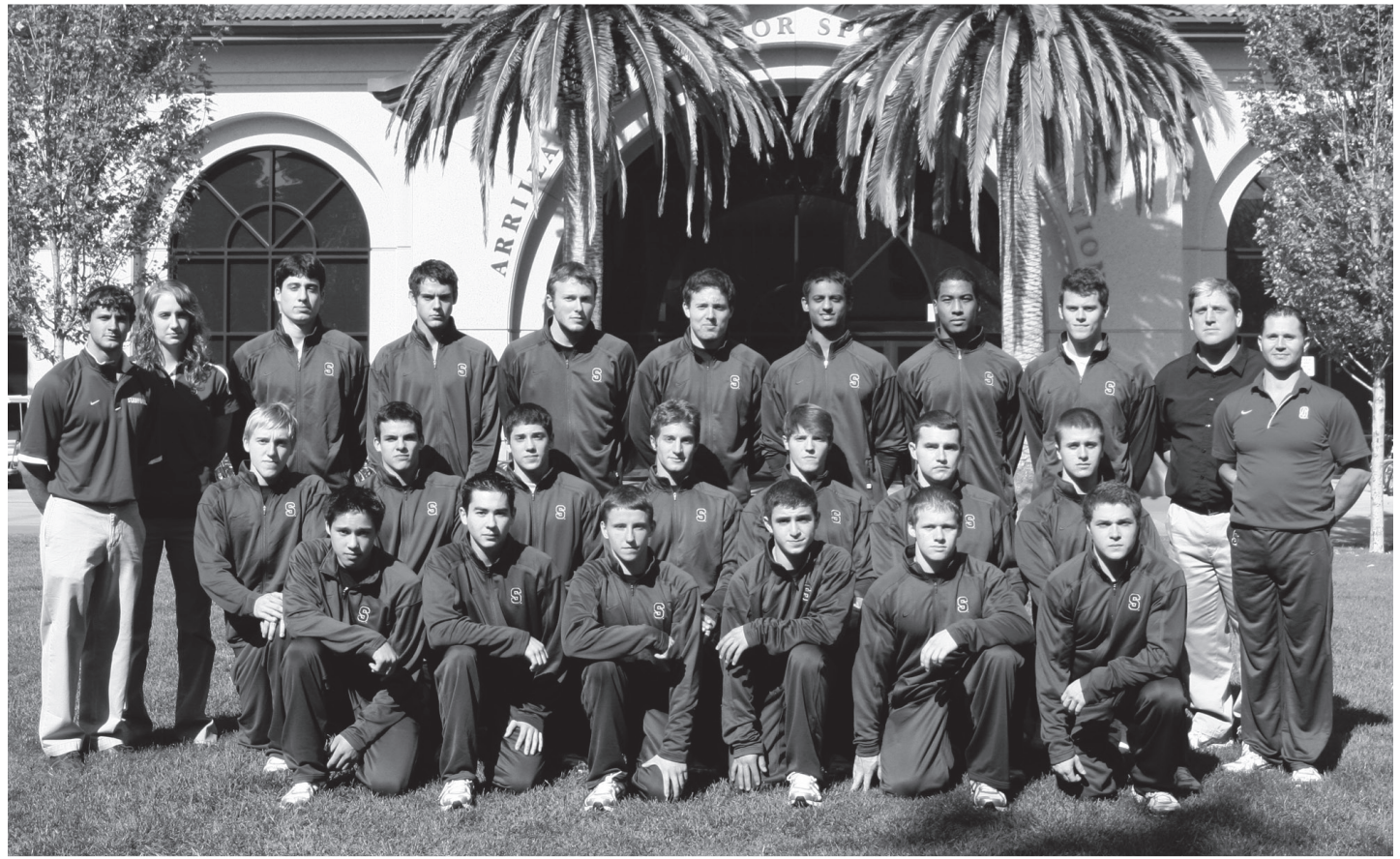
Four Cardinal veterans return in the all-around in Buscaglia, Dixon, Gentry and Lieberman. Dixon leads the way, having recorded an 86.8 at the Stanford Open last year. However, all four have scored over 82 and could be dangerous. Both Buscaglia and Gentry competed for the U.S. senior national team last summer and are looking to carry that over into the collegiate season. Adding depth on all six apparatuses are Ter-Zakariants and Nolf. In addition, the freshman Penev also has considerable upside, but may not be able to break into every event to have a chance in the all-around during his rookie year at Stanford.

Thom Glielmi enters his eighth season as head coach of the Stanford men's gymnastics team. Glielmi is the returning national coach of the year after leading the Cardinal to the NCAA title in 2009. In addition to his national coach of the year honor, Glielmi is a three-time NCAA West Region Head Coach of the Year from 2006-07 and 2009, and has coached ten NCAA Champions and 57 All-Americans.

The 2009 season was a culmination of Glielmi's efforts with the Stanford program. He led the Cardinal to the MPSF and NCAA titles after falling just short in previous seasons. The NCAA title was his first as a head coach for Glielmi and the fourth in Stanford history. Stanford earned the title with a 1.3 point advantage over second place Michigan. Glielmi added 11 more All-Americans in 2009.

In 2008, Glielmi led the Cardinal to its third consecutive top-three finish at the NCAA Championships, taking second just 0.45 points behind champion Oklahoma, and produced a single-season school record of 15 All-Americans.

Prior to taking over the men's team at Stanford, Glielmi spent three seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Minnesota and guided the team to a No. 7 finish during his last season in Minnesota. While with the Golden Gophers, Glielmi was named the 2000-01 NCAA Assistant Coach of the Year after coaching the 2001 NCAA pommel horse and floor exercise champion. Glielmi has produced NCAA national champions on vault, rings, pommel horse, floor exercise and horizontal bar.

Glielmi is involved on many levels of the sport from the grass roots level to the international elite. He is an FIG Brevet judge, an Executive Board Member to USA-Gymnastics (the governing body of gymnastics), and is also on the NCAA Rules Committee for the men's program.

A USA Senior National Team Coach for twelve years, Glielmi was a member of the 2006 and 2007 USA World Championships Team Coaching Staff. As head coach of the 2003 USA Pan American team he lead them to a bronze medal-winning competition. Additionally, he was part of the 2000 USA Olympic Team coaching staff.

Prior to coaching at Minnesota, he was the owner and head men's gymnastics coach at the International Sports Center in Matthews, N.C. A 1988 graduate of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Glielmi holds a bachelor of arts degree in communications.

JD Reive



JD Reive enters his seventh year as assistant coach for the Stanford men's gymnastics team.

The 2009 NCAA National Assistant Coach the Year, Reive helped the Cardinal over the top as Stanford captured its fourth NCAA title in school history. Assisting head coach Thom Glielmi, Stanford earned 11 All-America honors in 2009.

In 2008, Reive assisted the Cardinal to a second place finish at the NCAA Championships, with eight gymnasts earning eight All-American honors (15 total awards, the most in a single season in school history).

In 2007, Reive helped guide the team to its second-straight third place finish at the NCAA Championships, where five Stanford gymnasts were named All-Americans and two were crowned national champions.

In 2006, Reive was named the NCAA West Regional Assistant Coach of the Year, and aided the Cardinal to a third-place finish at the NCAA Championships with eleven gymnasts earning All-American honors.

Reive is heavily involved in gymnastics at every level of the sport. He is currently on both the USA Senior and Junior National Team Coaching Staffs with athletes representing both Stanford University and JDR, the Junior Olympic club program he founded in 2004.

As an athlete Reive was a prodigy coached by some of the most influential individuals in USA Gymnastics. Under 1996 Olympic Team coach Barry Weiner (currently head coach at the University of California-Berkeley) he earned a spot on the Junior National team at age 10. He began competing internationally at age 11, winning the 1988 Junior Pan American games. At age 15 he was invited to move to the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs where he trained under former Senior Men's National Team Coordinator Ron Brant. He moved onto the Senior National team at age 16 by taking second place in the all around at the 1993 Winter Cup. Throughout his career Reive remained on the USA National Team for nearly a decade. He has been involved with gymnastics for almost 30 years. Reive holds a bachelors of journalism and mass communications from the University of Nebraska.

Reive resides in Menlo Park with his wife, Doni, a former gymnast, World Championship medalist and three-time NCAA Team Champion, and their son Dante.



Bryant Hadden



Bryant Hadden is in his first season as a student assistant coach with Stanford. Hadden was a two-time All-America gymnast for the Cardinal, who completed his eligibility in 2009. The Cypress, Texas native finished fourth in 2008 and eighth in 2009 on rings at the NCAA Individual Championships to earn his All-America honors. Hadden was also a key member of the 2009 team that won the NCAA title under head coach Thom Glielmi. He now joins Glielmi's staff where he will bring his experience in the sport to the 2010 Cardinal team.

Andrew McIntyre



Andrew McIntyre joins the Cardinal coaching staff after three seasons as a student-athlete. McIntyre last competed for the Cardinal in 2007 when he was a NCAA competitor. McIntyre helped Stanford to a third-place national finish in 2007 when he competed on horizontal bar and pommel horse. This will be the first coaching experience for McIntyre who joins the staff of head coach Thom Glielmi.

Sho Nakamori



Nakamori joins the Cardinal coaching staff as a volunteer assistant after completing one of the most decorated careers in Stanford history. Nakamori completed the 2009 season by leading the Cardinal to the NCAA title and finishing with three All-America honors to give him eight for his career. Following the season, Nakamori went on to compete for the United States in international competition in Japan. In addition to joining the Stanford staff, Nakamori will continue to train with the goal of making the 2012 U.S. Olympic team that will compete in London.

Year in Review

After two years of coming close, 2009 marked the breakthrough season for Stanford as it captured the fourth NCAA title in program history. It was the first title for men's gymnastics since 1995. The Cardinal scored 362.800 to win the national championship by 1.3 points. It was the first title under head coach Thom Glielmi.

Stanford recorded team season-bests on still rings and parallel bars and two individual event titles to help boost itself atop the pack. Michigan came in second with a 361.500 and defending national champion Oklahoma followed in third with 361.200.

Men's gymnastics added to the growing number of Stanford NCAA titles, earning the 96th in school history (now at 97). In addition to the team title, seven athletes earned All-America honors in 11 events.

The Cardinal was led by senior Sho Nakamori, who earned All-America honors on the parallel bars, horizontal bar and in the floor exercise. Also, earning multiple honors were Tim Gentry in the still rings and the vault and Nicholas Noone on still rings and parallel bars. In addition, Alex Buscaglia (horizontal bar), Bryant Hadden (still rings), Ryan Lieberman (parallel bars) and Kyle Oi (still rings) each earned All-America status.

Along with the NCAA title, Stanford also won the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation title. It was Stanford's first conference title since 1995 when it also won the MPSF title. Nakamori led the way, winning the all-around title, three individual events and was named MPSF Gymnast of the Year. In addition, Josh Dixon took the conference title in the floor exercise, while Buscaglia tied Nakamori for the title on the horizontal bar.

Stanford also excelled in the classroom as it was named the College Gymnastics Association's national academic team of the year. The Cardinal achieved a team grade point average of 3.394, the highest of any team in the nation. It was the first time that a team won both the NCAA team title and the academic team of the year award in the same season.

Individually, nine Cardinal athletes were named All-America Scholar-Athletes, while five were named to the All-MPSF Scholar-Athlete team. Oi led the Cardinal as the only member named first team All-America Scholar-Athlete and MPSF Scholar-Athlete. Lucas Hughes and Abhinav Ramani were also named first team All-American Scholar Athlete. Earning second team All-America Scholar Athlete and MPSF Scholar-Athlete honors were Eric Hergenrader, Lieberman Nakamori and Noone. Earning second team All-America Scholar-Athletes honors were Gentry and Dixon.

Stanford University at a Glance

On October 1, 1891, the 465 new students who were on hand for opening day ceremonies at Leland Stanford Junior University greeted Leland and Jane Stanford enthusiastically, with a chant they had made up and rehearsed only that morning. Wah-hoo! Wah-hoo! L-S-J-U! Stanford! Its wild and spirited tone symbolized the excitement of this bold adventure. As a pioneer faculty member recalled, "Hope was in every heart, and the presiding spirit of freedom prompted us to dare greatly."

For the Stanford's on that day, the university was the realization of a dream and a fitting tribute to the memory of their only son, who had died of typhoid fever weeks before his sixteenth birthday. Far from the nation's center of culture and unencumbered by tradition or ivy, the new university drew students from all over the country; many from California; some who followed professors hired from other colleges and universities; and some simply seeking adventure in the West. Though there were many difficulties during the first months – housing was inadequate, microscopes and books were late in arriving from the East – the first year foretold of greatness. As Jane Stanford wrote in the summer of 1892, "Even our fondest hopes have been realized."

▼ Ideas of "Practical Education"

Governor and Mrs. Stanford had come from families of modest means and had built their way up through a life of hard work. So it was natural that their first thoughts were to establish an institution where young men and women could "grapple successfully with the practicalities of life." As their thoughts matured, these ideas of "practical education" enlarged to the concept of producing cultured and useful citizens who were well-prepared for professional success.

Nearly 116 years later, the university still enjoys the original 8,180 acres (almost 13 square miles) of grassy fields, eucalyptus groves, and rolling hills that were the Stanford's generous legacy, as well as the Quadrangle of "long corridors with their stately pillars" at the center of campus. It is still true, as the philosopher William James said, during his stint as a visiting professor, that the climate is "so friendly ... that every morning wakes one

fresh for new amounts of work."

▼ Current Perspectives

In other ways, the university has changed tremendously on its way to recognition as one of the world's great universities. At the hub of a vital and diverse Bay Area, Stanford is less than hour's drive south of San Francisco and just a few minutes north of the Silicon Valley, an area dotted with computer and high technology firms largely spawned by the university's faculty and graduates. On campus, students and faculty enjoy new libraries, modern laboratories, tremendous sports and recreation facilities, and comfortable residences. Contemporary sculpture, as well as pieces from the Stanford Museum's extensive collection of sculpture by Auguste Rodin, is placed throughout the campus, providing unexpected pleasures at many turns. At the Stanford Medical Center, world-renowned for its research, teaching, and patient care, scientists and physicians are searching for answers to fundamental questions about health and disease. Ninety miles down the coast, at Stanford's Hopkins Marine Station on the Monterey Bay, scientists are working to better understand the mechanisms of evolution, human development, and ecological systems.

The university is organized into seven schools: Earth Sciences, Education, Engineering, the Graduate School of Business, Humanities and Sciences, Law and Medicine. In addition, there are more than 30 interdisciplinary centers, programs, and research laboratories – including the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution and Peace; the Institute for International Studies; the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center; and the Stanford Center for the Study of Families, Children and Youth – where faculty from a wide range of fields bring different perspectives to bear on issues and problems. Stanford's Overseas Studies Program offers students in all fields remarkable opportunities for study abroad, with campuses in Australia, Beijing, Berlin, Cape Town, Florence, Kyoto, Madrid, Moscow, Oxford, Paris, and Santiago.





▼ Stanford People

By any measure, Stanford's faculty – which numbers just over 1,800 – is one of the most distinguished in the nation. As of the June of 2007, the faculty included 18 Nobel Laureates, four Pulitzer Prize winners, 24 MacArthur Fellows, 21 recipients of the National Medal of Science, three National Medley of Technology recipients, 228 members of the National Academy of Arts and Sciences, 135 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 83 National Academy of Engineering members, 29 members of the National Academy of Education, seven Wolf Foundation Prize winners, seven winners of the Koret Foundation Prize and three Presidential Medal of Freedom winners. Yet beyond their array of honors, what truly distinguishes Stanford faculty is their commitment to sharing knowledge with their students. The great majority of professors teach undergraduates both in introductory lecture classes and in small advanced seminars.

Currently 14881 students, of which 6689 are undergraduates, live and study on campus. A little more than 40 percent come from California, but all 50 states and approximately 68 countries are represented as well. Among undergraduates, approximately 55 percent are African American, Asian American, International, Mexican American, Native American, Native Hawaiian or Other Hispanic in ethnicity. Like the faculty, the Stanford student body is distinguished.



Approximately 10 students apply to Stanford for every place in the freshman class with 89% of those admitted finishing in the top 10% of their high school class. Ninety-four Stanford students have been named Rhodes Scholars, 74 have been selected Marshall Award winners, and 49 have been chosen Truman Scholars. Nearly 90 percent of graduating seniors plan to attend graduate or professional schools. Stanford students also shine in a tremendous array of activities outside the classroom – from student government to music, theater, and journalism. Through the Haas Center for Public Service, students participate in many community service activities, such as tutoring programs for children in nearby East Palo Alto, the Hunger Project, and the Arbor Free Clinic.

In the athletic arena, Stanford students have enjoyed tremendous success as well. Stanford fields teams in 36 Division I varsity sports (15 men, 20 women, 1 co-ed). Of Stanford's 95 NCAA titles (107 national), 55 have been captured since 1990, by far the most in the nation. Thirty-eight of Stanford's

athletes and coaches participated win the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona, 49 competed in Atlanta at the 1996 Games, 34 represented Stanford at the 2000 Games in Sydney, and 43 Stanford associates competed at the 2004 Games in Athens. Intramural and club sports are also popular; over 1,000 students take part in the club sports program, while participation in the intramural program has reached 9,000, with many students active in more than one sport.

▼ Looking Ahead

In her address to the Board of Trustees, in 1904, Jane Stanford said, "... Let us not be afraid to outgrow old thoughts and ways, and dare to think on new lines as to the future of the work under our care."

Her thoughts echo in the words of former Stanford President Gerhard Casper, who has said, "The true university must reinvent itself every day ... At Stanford, these are days of such reconsideration and fresh support for our fundamental tasks – teaching, learning, and research."

S BEYOND CAMPUS SAN FRANCISCO BAY AREA



From bustling cosmopolitan cities to quiet coastal retreats, the San Francisco Bay Area is incomparable. First-class attractions, world-class athletics, cultural diversity, remarkable skylines and breathtaking views make this region one of the world's most popular destinations.

Stanford's campus is located less than an hour's drive from San Francisco to the north, just minutes from the Silicon Valley to the south and within easy reach of the breathtaking coastal cities that line the Pacific Ocean to the west.

South of the Stanford campus are the cities of San Jose and Santa Clara, the anchors to the Silicon Valley. Computer firms and software companies can be found throughout the region, which is considered the leader among the world's technology industry.

One of the world's greatest stretches of coastline is located within a short drive from Stanford. To the south is the Monterey Peninsula, which includes the picturesque towns of Monterey, Carmel and Santa Cruz. The Monterey Bay Aquarium, Cannery Row and 17-Mile Drive along Pebble Beach are musts for visitors.

Further north and east of Marin County is the home to the Napa Wine Country and within a few hours drive from the Bay Area is Lake Tahoe, home to some of the finest skiing in the country and the wonders of Yosemite National Park.

The Bay Area is also home to six major professional sports franchises, including the San Francisco 49ers, Oakland Raiders, San Francisco Giants, Oakland A's, San Jose Sharks and Golden State Warriors.

Bob Bowsby

**The Jaquish & Kenninger
Director of Athletics**

One of the most respected athletic administrators in the nation, Bob Bowsby enters his fourth full year as the Jaquish & Kenninger Director of Athletics at Stanford University, a position he was appointed to on April 25, 2006 after spending 15 years at the helm of the University of Iowa's athletic program. In his initial three years in the position, Stanford has continued its well-earned reputation of fielding the most successful and wide-ranging Division I-A athletic programs in the nation.

As Stanford's sixth athletic director, Bowsby succeeds Ted Leland (1991-2005), Andy Geiger (1979-90), Joe Ruetz (1972-78), Chuck Taylor (1963-71) and Al Masters (1925-63). He directs a department that includes 35 intercollegiate varsity teams – 15 men's, 19 women's and one coed – plus the physical education department, intramurals, club sports, open recreation and the Stanford Golf Course.

Under his administrative guidance, Stanford claimed its unprecedented 15th straight Learfield Sports Director's Cup last spring, emblematic of the top overall program in the country. Ten Stanford teams boasted Top 10 finishes, winning national championships in men's gymnastics and women's rowing.

Stanford's student-athletes were also highly-decorated last year. Foluke Akinradewo (women's volleyball) earned her second straight national player of the year honor while eight student-athletes earned conference player of the year marks. In addition, Erik Shoji (men's volleyball) earned national freshman of the year accolades.

Two Stanford coaches--Thom Glielmi (men's gymnastics) and Yaz Farooq (women's rowing) earned national coach of the year marks.

Throughout his career, Bowsby has emerged as a national leader in intercollegiate and amateur athletics. He was named in February, 2007, to the United States Olympic Committee Board of Directors.

He has previously served as President of the NCAA Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association (2002-03), Chair of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee for two years (2003-05) and a committee member for five years, Chair of the Big Ten Administrator's Council (2002-04) and Chair of the NCAA Management Council.

Bowsby was appointed by President George Bush as a member of the Commission on Opportunities in Athletics in 2002-03. The committee was led by U.S. Secretary of Education Rod Paige.

Bowsby was elected chair of the NCAA Olympic Sports Liaison Committee and represented the NCAA as one of two voting members on the United States Olympic

Committee Board of Directors. He served as a member of the NCAA/U.S. Olympic Committee Task Force chaired by Cedric Dempsey and George Steinbrenner.

In addition, Bowsby served as chair of the NCAA Wrestling Committee and has served

on NCAA committees on Financial Aid and Amateurism, the Special Committee to Review Amateurism Issues and the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Athletics.

Bowsby has also served as an Executive Committee member with both the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics and the Division I-A Athletic Directors Association

and served as President of the I-A organization for two years.

The National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) named Bowsby in 2001-02 as Central Region Athletic Director of the Year and Sports Business Journal selected him from the four regional award winners as the National Athletics Director of the Year. The award highlights the efforts of the athletic directors for their commitment and positive contributions to campuses and their surrounding communities.

As the chief administrator for Iowa's athletic department from 1991-2006, Bowsby earned a reputation as one of the most admired, energetic and ambitious athletic administrators in the nation. Bowsby guided and supervised the merger of the Hawkeye's women's and men's athletics departments while enabling Iowa to maintain its standing as one of the most visible and successful Division I athletic programs.

Under his leadership, Iowa enjoyed unprecedented success and growth in the area of fund raising and facilities. Bowsby and the UI Development staff put in place \$25 million in endowments to help support Hawkeye student-athlete scholarship aid. In addition, he managed the planning and construction of \$120 million in facility projects on campus, including an \$87 million renovation to Kinnick Stadium.

A native of Waterloo, Iowa, Bowsby became Iowa's 10th Athletic Director in June, 1991, after serving in the same role at the University of Northern Iowa since 1984. Bowsby earned his bachelors degree from Moorhead State University (Minnesota) in 1975 and his master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1978.

Bob and his wife, Candice, have four children: Lisa, Matt, Rachel and Kyle.
