

# ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Stanford's women's lacrosse players are challenged to excel both in the classroom and on the field. In the latest Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores, which measure eligibility, retention and graduation over a four-year period, all 35 teams at Stanford exceeded the NCAA's standards. Five Cardinal teams earned a perfect 1,000, and the women's lacrosse team nearly did, scoring 993.

The women's lacrosse team continued to prove its commitment to academic excellence by placing 15 players on the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation's All-Academic team, the most in the conference. In all, Stanford has had 39 players earn a total of 65 All-Academic conference honors since the MPSF began selecting All-Academic teams in 2004.

Ten current players have earned All-Academic recognition and just-graduated Laura Shane earned the distinction of earning All-America and All-Academic honors.

# S LACROSSE CAPITAL OF THE WEST

Lacrosse is the fastest growing team sport in the West, and Stanford has contributed to that growth as a pioneer and trendsetter.

Need proof? Here it is:

Stanford was the first school in the Western United States to make women's lacrosse a Division I varsity sport, in 1995. Now, there are seven.

Stanford became the first Western school to break into the national rankings, in 2001. Now, the Cardinal has four Top 20 finishes in the past seven years.

Stanford became the first from the West to reach the NCAA women's tournament, in 2006. No others have done so.

And Stanford is the only Western team to win multiple conference championships at the Division I level. Now, Stanford has won 11 in the past 14 years, and no other school from the West has won more than one.


As Stanford's program continues to grow in stature, so does lacrosse in the Bay Area and California, as the sport gains inroads far from its Eastern strongholds.

Among the high schools, there were 40 boys' varsity programs in the state in 2000 and hardly a girls' program in existence. Today, there are 175 boys' varsity programs in California and 134 for girls.


The Greater Bay Area alone has 51 girls' varsity programs and 16 high school club teams.

Overall, club participation in Northern California has grown exponentially, and even the pros are taking notice, with two franchises establishing themselves in the Bay Area in recent years: the men's indoor San Jose Stealth introduced professional lacrosse to the West Coast in 2004, and the outdoor San Francisco Dragons arrived in 2005.

Stanford was there from the beginning, and maintains its place as the center of the lacrosse explosion.





## Promise. Potential. Possibilities.

When the new Stanford women's lacrosse coaches describe the landscape that brought them West, those were the thoughts that made the job so enticing.

Stanford has had its share of success. The Cardinal is a four-time defending Mountain Pacific Sports Federation tournament champion. It reached the NCAA tournament in 2006. It's ranked No. 18 in the national preseason coaches' poll and is playing one of the toughest schedules in the country, one that includes seven Top-20 teams and three East Coast trips.

But it's the allure of what has yet to be achieved that's so compelling. The reason: Because at Stanford it's possible. History proves it.

Nineteen of Stanford's 35 sports have combined to win a total of 109 national team championships; the school has won 14 consecutive Director's Cups symbolic of the nation's best overall sports program; and, as Northwestern has shown, lacrosse championships can be won outside the strongholds of the Eastern-dominated sport.

"Our players want to be established as a top team, and to be recognized nationally as so many of the teams at Stanford are," new head coach Amy Bokker said.

So, where does Stanford begin? How about March 9, 2008?

That was the day Stanford stunned visiting Penn, 10-8, to complete its second upset of a top-10 team within a week. Earlier, Stanford beat Notre Dame, 13-9. The significance grew as the season wore on. The loss was the only one for Penn until the NCAA championship game. Notre Dame also went on to the NCAA tournament.

For a Stanford team that returns 21 of its 29 players and seven starters, those victories from a 12-8 season may provide a lasting effect.

"They put themselves on the map," Bokker said. "There is a high level of confidence."

A new coaching staff that also includes Canadian national teamer Brooke McKenzie and former William and Mary standout Jaime Sellers spent a large amount of its fall efforts getting to know what it had. That meant evaluating players, solidifying defensive principles and techniques, and determining the styles that work best for its personnel.

"We're trying to find those players that will help us build a national championship team," said McKenzie, who accompanied Bokker from George Mason. "A lot of programs say they're capable of doing that, but we're one of the schools that can. People understand and respect the type of potential that Stanford represents."

What they discovered was a versatile team with good instincts, scoring ability, solid goalkeeping, athleticism and depth. With those attributes, the team will play a high-paced style that features defensive pressure to create turnovers and trigger fastbreaks.

"We couldn't hold them back," Bokker said proudly. "I feel like they were busting at the seams to really start showing what they can do."

Now, comes that chance.

The following is a position-by-position breakdown of Stanford's team:



## Goalkeeper

Sophomore Annie Read, a backup last year to second-team All-America Laura Shane, proved herself with a series of outstanding performances during the fall season and assured her coaches that the position is in good hands by taking on her role with confidence and poise.

"Annie has shown that she is a shot-stopper," Bokker said. "What I'm looking for in a goalie is to make saves that you should make, while also making a couple of big saves each game. Annie has shown she can do that, and more."

## Defense

Most of the early coaching emphasis was placed toward the defense, which has made great progress and continues to improve. Because of graduation and injuries, the unit is young and will look toward co-captain Melissa Vogelsson and fellow senior Maris Perlman to be the "backbone" of the defense that will play mostly man to man, and switch to zone in certain situations.

"What's nice about those two is they play very differently," Bokker said. "Voges is a thinker, directing traffic. She's the core of our zone. Maris is super quick, very feisty and has really good hands to check. It's nice to have that balance."

Senior Vikki Fanslow had been slowed by injuries, but has quickly added herself in the mix, and junior Eleanor Foote and sophomore Ashley Aruffo will man lower defensive spots. Sarah Blahnik has made a smooth transition from attack to defense, and the defense also gets a boost from freshmen Paige Farmakis and Catherine Swanson, with Caroline Smith providing depth to the unit.

## Midfield

The team's deepest and strongest unit features versatile players that are willing and capable of moving into the defense or attack.

Bokker believes scoring will be a strength, mainly because it can come from a variety of players and positions. Dana Lindsay is perfect example. The attacking midfielder is the team's top returning scorer, with 31 goals and 16 assists last season.

All-MPSF first-team choice Julie Christy, co-captain Bess Siegfried and sophomore Karen Nesbitt scored a combined 44 goals in 2008. Christy scored three, including the eventual winner, in the 9-8 tournament final victory over Denver.

In addition, Lauren Schmidt, a full-time starter as a freshman in 2007, returns after missing last season with a knee injury. And Leslie Foard and Jamie Nesbitt are expected to be key contributors.

"What's nice about our midfielders is that a lot of them are willing to take the risks defensively that initiate the type of offense we like to play," Bokker said. "All of the midfielders have the ability to make a difference at both ends, which ends up being a huge advantage because there aren't any holes."

Freshmen Anna and Emilie Boeri bring another fresh set of legs and great stick skills to the midfield.

## Attack

Stanford's offense will run through junior Claire Hubbard and sophomore Sarah Flynn. In essence, they are the point guards of the team.

"They're controlling tempo, they're deciding when we're going to push the fastbreak and deciding when we need to settle it down," Bokker said. "The two are really heads-up players and have good recognition of momentum in the game."

Attacking midfielders Maggie Sachs, Amanda Schwab, and freshman Ilyssa McIntyre look to be strong scoring options, as does Charity Fluharty, who scored two goals in the epic victory against Penn. Freshman Maria Fortino could also provide an offensive spark.

Overall, "I have pretty high expectations," Bokker said. "Their energy is high. They want to own the MPSF. This year, I expect to contend for an at-large bid to the tournament, and we have the schedule that allows us to do that."

Thus, Year One of a new era of Stanford lacrosse begins.

"They're hungry for success and willing to embrace the challenges that come with it," McKenzie said. "Because we're starting with a strong foundation, the potential that we have to achieve that success is huge."

## AMY BOKKER

### HEAD COACH

First Season at Stanford  
William and Mary, 1995



First-year coach Amy Bokker takes over a Stanford program that has excelled at the regional level, and now strives to make an impact on the national scene. Bokker's experience makes her ideal for such a role, having been in a similar situation when she took over the George Mason program in 1998 in Fairfax, Va., an area without a strong lacrosse tradition.

Bokker made an immediate impact, guiding the Patriots to the first winning record in school history, with an 8-7 mark. During her tenure at George Mason, Bokker's squads maintained their status as one of the nation's elite programs, with six top-20 national finishes, including a final national ranking of No. 16 last season when the Patriots went 12-5, setting a school record for single-season victories. During her 11 seasons at George Mason, Bokker compiled an 86-94 record and left as the winningest coach in the program's history. She entered this season with a career head-coaching record of 94-102.

At George Mason, Bokker coached nine All-Americans, two Academic All-Americans, a Colonial Athletic Association Player of the Year, two CAA Defensive Players of the Year and a CAA Rookie of the Year. In all, Bokker coached 18 first-team all-conference players and her players totaled 48 all-conference honors.

Before her arrival at George Mason, Bokker served as the head coach at American for a season, leading the Eagles to a school-best 8-8 record and was named the 1997 CAA Coach of the Year.

The former Amy Umbach is a native of Phoenixville, Pa., where she was a three-sport high school star, in lacrosse, field hockey and swimming. She was a two-time All-CAA first-team choice at William and Mary, where she also played field hockey.

Bokker also serves as an assistant coach to the Canadian national team, which will play in the Women's World Cup this summer in the Czech Republic. Bokker is the sixth head coach in the 15-year history of varsity women's lacrosse at Stanford.

Bokker and her husband, Scott, were married on June 12, 2004. The couple has a son, Chase, and a daughter, Alexis.

## BROOKE McKENZIE

### ASSISTANT COACH

First Season  
James Madison, 2006



Brooke McKenzie arrives at Stanford as an active international competitor and a veteran of Amy Bokker's staff at George Mason.

McKenzie was a four-year starting attacker at James Madison and helped the Dukes to three Colonial Athletic Association titles and two NCAA quarterfinal appearances. She remains an active player and will represent Canada at the Women's World Cup in the Czech Republic, on June 18-27, 2009. This will be McKenzie's second World Cup, having played on Canada's fourth-place team in 2005. She made her national-team debut in 2003.

The Englewood, Colo., native is the daughter of 1980 Pittsburgh Penguin draft pick Steve McKenzie and was born in Corner Brook, in Newfoundland, Canada, while her father was playing minor-league hockey there.

McKenzie received unique insight into coaching during her final season at James Madison, completing a coaching internship under former James Madison head coach Kellie Young. This prior coaching experience helped McKenzie immediately fulfill her duties of assisting with an offensive gameplan, recruiting and scouting opponents when she arrived at George Mason.



## JAIME SELLERS

### ASSISTANT COACH

First Season  
William and Mary, 2008



Jaime Sellers is a first-year assistant coach, having graduated from William and Mary last spring after a 66-goal season that was good enough to break a school single-season record that had stood for more than 30 years. The All-Colonial Athletic Association first-team midfielder player handles the defense and scouting as her main coaching responsibilities.

Last season, Sellers scored three goals against Stanford and three against Bokker and McKenzie's George Mason team. Over her career, Sellers scored 108 goals and had 19 assists for 127 points.

The native of Kennebunk, Maine, led the Tribe in six categories as a senior (goals, points, draw controls, shots, free position goals, shots on goal) and scored five game-winning goals, while earning All-South Region second-team honors.

Laura Shane, the most accomplished player in Stanford history, serves as a volunteer assistant coach while pursuing a master's in engineering. Shane, a native of Towson, Md., is regarded as the finest goalie in Stanford history and will act as the team's goalkeeper coach.





## Stanford University at a Glance

On October 1, 1891, the 465 new students who were on hand for opening day ceremonies at Leland Stanford Junior University greeted Leland and Jane Stanford enthusiastically, with a chant they had made up and rehearsed only that morning. Wah-hoo! Wah-hoo! L-S-J-U! Stanford! Its wild and spirited tone symbolized the excitement of this bold adventure. As a pioneer faculty member recalled, "Hope was in every heart, and the presiding spirit of freedom prompted us to dare greatly."



For the Stanford's on that day, the university was the realization of a dream and a fitting tribute to the memory of their only son, who had died of typhoid fever weeks before his sixteenth birthday. Far from the nation's center of culture and unencumbered by tradition or ivy, the new university drew students from all over the country: many from California; some who followed professors hired from other colleges and universities; and some simply seeking adventure in the West. Though there were many difficulties during the first months – housing was inadequate, microscopes and books were late in arriving from the East – the first year foretold of greatness. As Jane Stanford wrote in the summer of 1892, "Even our fondest hopes have been realized."

### Ideas of "Practical Education"

Governor and Mrs. Stanford had come from families of modest means and had built their way up through a life of hard work. So it was natural that their first thoughts were to establish an institution where young men and women could "grapple successfully with the practicalities of life." As their thoughts matured, these ideas of "practical education" enlarged to the concept of producing cultured and useful citizens who were well-prepared for professional success.

Nearly 116 years later, the university still enjoys the original 8,180 acres (almost 13 square miles) of grassy fields, eucalyptus groves, and rolling hills that were the Stanford's generous legacy, as well as the Quadrangle of "long corridors with their stately pillars" at the center of campus. It is still true, as the philosopher William James said, during his stint as a visiting professor, that the climate is "so friendly ... that every morning wakes one fresh for new amounts of work."

### Current Perspectives

In other ways, the university has changed tremendously on its way to recognition as one of the world's great universities. At the hub of a vital and diverse Bay Area, Stanford is less than hour's drive south of San Francisco and just a few minutes north of the Silicon Valley, an area dotted with computer and high technology firms largely spawned by the university's faculty and graduates. On campus, students and faculty enjoy new libraries, modern laboratories, tremendous sports and recreation facilities, and comfortable residences. Contemporary sculpture, as well as pieces from the Stanford Museum's extensive collection of sculpture by Auguste Rodin, is placed throughout the campus, providing unexpected pleasures at many turns. At the Stanford Medical Center, world-renowned for its research, teaching, and patient care, scientists and physicians are searching for answers to fundamental questions about health and disease. Ninety miles down the coast, at Stanford's Hopkins Marine



Station on the Monterey Bay, scientists are working to better understand the mechanisms of evolution, human development, and ecological systems.

The university is organized into seven schools: Earth Sciences, Education, Engineering, the Graduate School of Business, Humanities and Sciences, Law and Medicine. In addition, there are more than 30 interdisciplinary centers, programs, and research laboratories – including the Hoover Institution on War, Revolution and Peace; the Institute for International Studies; the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center; and the Stanford Center for the Study of Families, Children and Youth – where faculty from a wide range of fields bring different perspectives to bear on issues and problems. Stanford's Overseas Studies Program offers students in all fields remarkable opportunities for study abroad, with campuses in Australia, Beijing, Berlin, Cape Town, Florence, Kyoto, Madrid, Moscow, Oxford, Paris, and Santiago.



## Stanford People

By any measure, Stanford's faculty – which numbers just over 1,800 – is one of the most distinguished in the nation. As of the June of 2007, the faculty included 18 Nobel Laureates, four Pulitzer Prize winners, 24 MacArthur Fellows, 21 recipients of the National Medal of Science, three National Medley of Technology recipients, 228 members of the National Academy of Arts and Sciences, 135 members of the National Academy of Sciences, 83 National Academy of Engineering members, 29 members of the National Academy of Education, seven Wolf Foundation Prize winners, seven winners of the Koret Foundation Prize and three Presidential Medal of Freedom winners. Yet beyond their array of honors, what truly distinguishes Stanford faculty is their commitment to sharing knowledge with their students. The great majority of professors teach undergraduates both in introductory lecture classes and in small advanced seminars.

Currently 14881 students, of which 6689 are undergraduates, live and study on campus. A little more than 40 percent come from California, but all 50 states and approximately 68 countries are represented as well. Among undergraduates, approximately 55 percent are African American, Asian American, International, Mexican American, Native American, Native Hawaiian or Other Hispanic in ethnicity. Like the faculty, the Stanford student body is distinguished. Approximately 10 students apply to Stanford for every place



in the freshman class with 89% of those admitted finishing in the top 10% of their high school class. Ninety-four Stanford students have been named Rhodes Scholars, 74 have been selected Marshall Award winners, and 49 have been chosen Truman Scholars. Nearly 90 percent of graduating seniors plan to attend graduate or professional schools. Stanford students also shine in a tremendous array of activities outside the classroom – from student government to music, theater, and journalism. Through the Haas Center for Public Service, students participate in many community service activities, such as tutoring programs for children in nearby East Palo Alto, the Hunger Project, and the Arbor Free Clinic.

In the athletic arena, Stanford students have enjoyed tremendous success as well. Stanford fields teams in 36 Division I varsity sports (15 men, 20 women, 1 co-ed). Of Stanford's 95 NCAA titles (107 national), 55 have been captured since 1990, by far the most in the nation. Thirty-eight of Stanford's athletes and coaches participated in the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona, 49 competed in Atlanta at the 1996 Games, 34 represented Stanford at the 2000 Games in Sydney, and 43 Stanford associ-

ates competed at the 2004 Games in Athens. Intramural and club sports are also popular; over 1,000 students take part in the club sports program, while participation in the intramural program has reached 9,000, with many students active in more than one sport.

## Looking Ahead

In her address to the Board of Trustees, in 1904, Jane Stanford said, “. . . Let us not be afraid to outgrow old thoughts and ways, and dare to think on new lines as to the future of the work under our care.”

Her thoughts echo in the words of former Stanford President Gerhard Casper, who has said, “The true university must reinvent itself every day . . . At Stanford, these are days of such reconsideration and fresh support for our fundamental tasks – teaching, learning, and research.”



**Bob BOWLSBY**

**THE JAQUISH & KENNINGER DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS**

One of the most respected and admired athletic administrators in the nation, Bob Bowsby enters his third full year as the Jaquish & Kenninger Director of Athletics at Stanford University, a position he was appointed to on April 25, 2006 after spending 15 years at the helm of the University of Iowa's athletic program. In his initial two years in the position, Stanford has continued its well-earned reputation of fielding the most successful and wide-ranging Division I-A athletic programs in the nation.

As Stanford's sixth athletic director, Bowsby succeeds Ted Leland (1991-2005), Andy Geiger (1979-90), Joe Ruetz (1972-78), Chuck Taylor (1963-71) and Al Masters (1925-63). Bowsby directs a department that includes 35 intercollegiate varsity teams – 15 men's, 19 women's and one coed – plus the physical education department, intramurals, club sports, open recreation and the Stanford Golf Course. The department has an annual budget of approximately \$75 million and a staff of over 225.

"Bob Bowsby represents the best professional and personal values when it comes to student-athletes," said Stanford University Provost John Etchemendy. "He understands that the success of an athletics program is not simply measured in wins and losses, but in the academic achievements and character of the young women and men who work so hard on the field and in the classroom."

Under his administrative guidance, Stanford claimed its unprecedented 14th straight U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup last year, emblematic of the top overall program in the country. Sixteen Stanford teams boasted Top 10 finishes, winning national championships in women's cross country and synchronized swimming. In addition, the women's volleyball, women's basketball and men's golf teams enjoyed runner-up NCAA Tournament finishes in their respective sports, while the men's basketball team advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. Eight Stanford teams claimed conference championships.

Stanford's student-athletes were also highly-decorated last season. Two players – Foluke Akinradewo (women's volleyball) and Candice Wiggins (women's basketball) – earned national player of the year honors while nine student-athletes earned conference player of the year marks. In addition, three student-athletes – Hilary Barte (women's tennis), Alex Clayton (men's tennis) and Alix Klineman (women's volleyball) – earned national freshmen of the year accolades.

Stanford student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom, as 14 Cardinal student-athletes earned academic All-America status during the 2007-08 season. Six Stanford student-athletes – Neftalem Araia (cross country), Russell Brown (track and field), Rachel Buehler (women's soccer), Tanner Gardner (wrestling), Rob Grube (men's golf) and Arianna Lambie (women's cross country) – were named Pac-10 Scholar Athletes of the Year.

Ten Stanford student-athletes – Araia, Buehler, Dylan Carney (men's gymnastics), Michael Garcia (men's track and field), Gardner, Sandy Hohener (men's water polo), Graeme Hoste (men's track and field), Josh Hustedt (track and field), Lambie and Laura Shane (lacrosse) – were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholars. In addition, Carney was the recipient of the Walter Byers Postgraduate Scholarship, the highest academic honor in intercollegiate athletics.

Bowsby continues to leave his mark in Stanford's coaching circles. Under first-year head coach Jim Harbaugh, the Stanford football team was one of the most improved squads in the Pac-10 Conference last season, as evident of wins over top-ranked (*USA Today*) USC and defending Pac-10 Conference co-champion Cal. Last spring, Bowsby ushered in a new era of Stanford basketball with the hiring of head coach Johnny Dawkins.

Throughout his career, Bowsby has emerged as a national leader in intercollegiate and amateur athletics. He was named in February, 2007, to the United States Olympic Committee Board of Directors.

He has previously served as President of the NCAA Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association (2002-03), Chair of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee for two years (2003-05) and a committee member for five years, Chair of the Big Ten Administrator's Council (2002-04) and Chair of the NCAA Management Council.

Bowsby was appointed by President George Bush as a member of the Commission on Opportunities in Athletics in 2002-03. The committee was led by U.S. Secretary of Education Rod Paige.

Bowsby was elected chair of the NCAA Olympic Sports Liaison Committee and represented the NCAA as one of two voting members on the United States Olympic Committee Board of Directors. He served as a member of the NCAA/U.S. Olympic Committee Task Force chaired by Cedric Dempsey and George Steinbrenner.

In addition, Bowsby served as chair of the NCAA Wrestling Committee and has served on NCAA committees on Financial Aid and Amateurism, the Special Committee to Review Amateurism Issues and the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Athletics.

Bowsby has also served as an Executive Committee member with both the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics and the Division I-A Athletic Directors Association and served as President of the I-A organization for two years.

The National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) named Bowsby in 2001-02 as Central Region Athletic Director of the Year and *Sports Business Journal* selected him from the four regional award winners as the National Athletics Director of the Year. The award highlights the efforts of the athletic directors for their commitment and positive contributions to campuses and their surrounding communities.

As the chief administrator for Iowa's athletic department from 1991-2006, Bowsby earned a reputation as one of the most admired, energetic and ambitious athletic administrators in the nation. Bowsby guided and supervised the merger of the Hawkeye's women's and men's athletics departments while enabling Iowa to maintain its standing as one of the most visible and successful Division I athletic programs.

Under his leadership, Iowa enjoyed unprecedented success and growth in the area of fund raising and facilities. Bowsby and the UI Development staff put in place \$25 million in endowments to help support Hawkeye student-athlete scholarship aid. In addition, he managed the planning and construction of \$120 million in facility projects on campus, including an \$87 million renovation to Kinnick Stadium.

A native of Waterloo, Iowa, Bowsby became Iowa's 10th Athletic Director in June, 1991, after serving in the same role at the University of Northern Iowa since 1984. Bowsby earned his bachelor's degree from Moorhead State University (Minnesota) in 1975 and his master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1978. He and his wife, Candice, have four children: Lisa, Matt, Rachel and Kyle.
