## 2013 Season in Review

### Cardinal Rising

Stanford's 11-3 record last season made the Cardinal one of just two FBS programs with at least 11 wins in each of the last four seasons.

By virtue of winning its second straight Pac-12 championship, Stanford played in consecutive Rose Bowl games and became one of just five schools ever to play in four straight BCS games.

Stanford's 26-20 victory over No. 2 Oregon in 2013 gave the team three wins in the last two years over the AP's No. 1 and No. 2 ranked teams. Over the stretch, the rest of college football has combined for five wins over No. 1/2 ranked teams.

### Home Boys

Stanford went 7-0 in the friendly confines of Stanford Stadium to keep alive its active 16-game home winning streak - the second-longest in the nation behind South Carolina (17). The Cardinal is 37-3 (.925) at Stanford Stadium since the final home game of 2007.

### Tough Ticket

Stanford sold out its season ticket allotment with more than 33,000 tickets sold by early June. In addition to season tickets, Stanford reserves 5,000 student tickets for every game -- at least 71.4 percent of Stanford's undergraduate population of 6,999 could be in attendance for most games.

### The Polls

Stanford finished another year in the national polls and has been ranked in the AP's top 25 for a school-record 64 consecutive weeks. The streak is tied for the fifth longest in the nation, dating back to Sept. 5, 2010.

After its 11-3 campaign in 2013, Stanford was ranked 11th by the AP and 10th in the USA Today Coaches' poll, marking the fourth straight season the Cardinal finished inside the top 10 of at least one poll after being ranked No. 7/6 at the conclusion of 2012, 7/6 at the conclusion of 2011 and No. 4/4 at the conclusion of the 2010 season.

### Outranking The Opposition

Stanford defeated six ranked opponents in 2013 (No. 23 Arizona State, No. 15 Washington, No. 9 UCLA, No. 2 Oregon, No. 25 Notre Dame, No. 11 Arizona State - Pac-12 Football Championship Game) including five at Stanford Stadium. Four of those home victories were in consecutive home games. All marks are the first such occurrences in program history.

Stanford is 10-1 in its last 11 games against opponents ranked in the AP top 25, including 6-1 in 2013.

### #NerdNation

Stanford, Georgia, Rice and Tulane shared the American Football Coaches Association's 2013 Academic Achievement Award, which is presented by the Touchdown Club of Memphis. The four schools recorded a 100 percent graduation rate for members of its freshman football student-athlete class of 2006. This is the second honor for Stanford, which also won the award in 2012.

Senior punter Ben Rhyne was the Pac-12 Football Scholar-Athlete of the Year and boasted the highest grade point average among all players in the league.

### Roses

Stanford played in the Rose Bowl Game in consecutive seasons for the first time since 1970-1971. The Cardinal is 6-8 all-time in the game.

### True North

Stanford reached the 11-win mark for a school-record fourth straight season (2009-13).

Prior to 2009, Stanford won 10 or more games just three times.

Stanford won 10 or more games in 1908, 1914 and 1915 (rugby-style rules).

### In a Rush

In seven home wins last year Stanford out-rushed opposing teams, 1,529-497, an average of 218.5 to 71.0.

### Grinding

Stanford rushed for 2,904 yards in 2013, surpassing the previous season record of 2,837 set in 2009.

In Stanford's 11 victories of 2013, quarterback Kevin Hogan attempted just 17 fourth-quarter passes (nine completions).

### #PartyInTheBackfield

Stanford led the nation with 44 sacks (and sack yards with 310) in 2013 after leading the nation in 2012. The Cardinal ranked seventh in tackles for loss in 2013 at nearly eight per game.

According to ESPN Stats & Info, Stanford made initial contact with opposing rushers at or behind the line of scrimmage on 48 percent of carries.

### The Lowdown

Stanford held four opponents to season-low yardage in 2013.

- Oregon State (288 yards below average)
- Oregon (253 below average)
- UCLA (182 below average)
- San Jose State (242 below average)

### Field Flippers

Stanford's special teams unit was ranked as the nation's best according to pundit Phil Steele, and special teams coordinator Pete Alamar earned national coach of the year honors.

### Run First ... and Second ... and ...

In Stanford's 26-20 victory over Oregon, the Cardinal ran the ball on all 17 of its fourth-quarter offensive snaps.

### Hold Up

Stanford's offensive line was whistled for just three holding penalties in 2013, and just two from the line of scrimmage (covering 886 offensive snaps).

### Dig the Long Ball

Stanford scored 23 offensive touchdowns covering 20 or more yards in 2013.



### Depth

Eighteen different Cardinal players caught a pass last season.

### Hard to Get

Stanford held six opponents scoreless in the first quarter in 2013.

Stanford allowed just five first-quarter touchdowns.

Stanford held opponents to seven or fewer first-half points in eight games last season.

In consecutive games against UCLA, Oregon State and Oregon, Stanford allowed just three first-half points and 319 total yards.

- Stanford limited UCLA to zero first-half points and 84 total yards.
- Stanford limited Oregon State to three first-half points and 98 yards.
- Stanford limited Oregon to zero first-half points and 137 total yards.
- The last time Oregon was shut out and trailing by 17 points or more in the first half was vs. BYU in 2006.

### Everybody's All-Americans

Trent Murphy (consensus), Ty Montgomery (consensus) and David Yankey (unanimous) were named to virtually every All-America first-team in 2013 including the nation's oldest, the Walter Camp Football Foundation. It marked the second time in the last three years that Stanford has had three WCFF All-Americans, with eight first teamers in the past five years.

### Draft Notes

Stanford had a record-tying six former players selected in the 2014 NFL Draft, tying the mark previously set in 1972, 1975, 1985 and 2005.

It marked the fifth straight year that Stanford had at least three players drafted. Stanford's 2014 draft class finished their Cardinal careers with four straight BCS bowl games and a 32-2 record at Stanford Stadium.

Stanford led all Pac-12 teams with its six draft selections. UCLA (5) and Oregon (4) followed with the conference seeing 34 selections in all.

The draft class joins a group of 29 former Stanford players who are either currently on NFL rosters or finished the 2013 season on an NFL roster.

### Hoagie Time

Kevin Hogan ended the regular season ranked No. 2 in career completion percentage (.650) at Stanford. Andrew Luck's .670 mark ranks first. Hogan also sits second behind Luck (162.7) in career passing efficiency (151.9).

Hogan threw for career highs of 295 first-half and 329 total yards against Cal with five touchdown passes (all in the first half). His scoring strikes were 50, 12, 72 (career-long), 45 and 9 yards.

Hogan threw for then-career highs of 222 first-half and 286 total yards against Washington State with three touchdown passes. His scoring strikes were 57, 33 and 45 yards while also adding a 48-yard completion.

### Jet-Set

Ty Montgomery finished second nationally in kickoff return average (30.3) in 2013. Montgomery was the only player on a BCS conference team with two kickoff returns for a touchdown.

Montgomery finished ninth nationally in all-purpose yards (157.7/game) in 2013.

Montgomery collected 2,208 all-purpose yards in 2013, finishing just shy of the program's all-time mark of 2,234, set by Glyn Milburn in 1992.

Montgomery led the team in receptions in 13 of its 14 games of 2013.

Montgomery scored on his first four touches against Cal with a 31-yard rushing touchdown and receiving touchdowns of 50, 12 and 74 yards. He then added a 17-yard first down reception and a 9-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter to finish the half with five touchdowns on 160 receiving and 31 rushing yards (seven touches).

Montgomery tied a single-game record (Darrin Nelson on Oregon State in 1981) for touchdowns (5) and points (30) against Cal, all in the first half.

Montgomery registered career highs in all-purpose yards in consecutive games with 290 yards against Washington on nine touches (32.2 yards/touch) and 296 at Utah on 14 touches (21.4 yards/touch).

### Marauding Murphy

Trent Murphy finished second on Stanford's all-time sacks list with 32.5 following 15.0 in the 2013 season.

He finished in fifth place on Stanford's career tackle for loss list (52.5). Riall Johnson is fourth with 53.0.

### Quite the Gaff

Tyler Gaffney (2,500 - 7th best all-time) was the third Stanford running back since 2009 to record at least 1,000 career rushing yards, joining Toby Gerhart (3,522) and Stepfan Taylor (4,300).

Gaffney had 21 rushing touchdowns (Pac-12 leader) and just 41 yards lost in 2013.

Gaffney's 33 career rushing touchdowns was third all-time behind Tommy Vardell (39).

### Big Game

Stanford's 63 points against Cal set a record for the most in the 116-game series, and its 42 first-half points were the most in a half in school history.

Stanford's 50-point victory against Cal (63-13) was the most in the 116-game series.

### Breaker, Breaker

In the first half alone, three Pac-12 Football Championship game records were broken and five were broken overall.

Tyler Gaffney ran for 91 yards on seven attempts in the first quarter, breaking the old record for most yards gained in a quarter. His 69-yard touchdown run in the first quarter was also a new record for longest run. Gaffney's three rushing touchdowns tied Pac-12 Championship game records set by Oregon's LaMichael James in 2011 for most rushing touchdowns and most touchdowns scored while also tying James's records of most points scored (18) and most 100-plus yard rushing performances (1) in the game's history.

Kevin Hogan's fourth-quarter 78-yard pass to Devon Cajuste was the longest passing play from scrimmage in Pac-12 Championship game history.

Cajuste set a new receiving record, racking up 120 yards on two catches with more than half the yards coming from the fourth-quarter catch.

The Cardinal defense allowed the fewest points (14), fewest rushing yards (138) and fewest total yards (311) in the game's history. The previous lows were 24, 160 and 325, respectively.

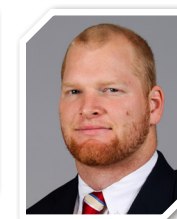

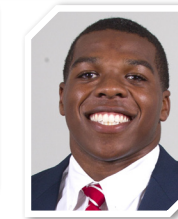

### Stanford Tripped in Rose Bowl

PASADENA, Calif. - Stanford took a 10-0 lead after the first quarter, but could not hold on as Michigan State came back for a 24-20 victory in the 100th Rose Bowl Game.



Tyler Gaffney ran for 91 yards and an early touchdown for Stanford (11-3), and linebacker Kevin Anderson returned an interception 40 yards for a score late in the first half. But the Cardinal couldn't follow up last season's victory in Pasadena with back-to-back Rose Bowl wins, managing three points from the offense after the first quarter.

Kevin Hogan threw for 143 yards on 10-of-18 passing, including a 51-yard connection to Devon Cajuste in the third quarter and a 43-yard strike to Michael Rector in the first.

Ed Reynolds led the defense with 10 tackles and Shayne Skov had a sack and three tackles for loss. But Michigan State's Connor Cook passed for a career-high 332 yards on 22-of-36 passing.

Cook's connection with Tony Lippett in the fourth quarter proved to be the difference.

The tiebreaking pass came from 25-yards out and Stanford could not muster a comeback of its own, despite a late field goal from Jordan Williamson.

Cook also threw a touchdown pass to Trevon Pendleton, and Jeremy Langford rushed for 84 yards and a score in the first Rose Bowl victory in 26 years for the Big Ten champion Spartans, who finished the season with 10 straight wins.

Michigan State's defense capped its season with one more old-school, smash-mouth performance during the centennial celebration of The Granddaddy of Them All.

The Spartan's defense ended it by stopping the Pac-12 champion Cardinal on fourth-and-1 with 1:46 to play, stuffing a run play up the middle. Kyler Elsworth, who started in place of suspended senior leader Max Bullough, hurdled the pile to deliver an electrifying, head-on hit to fullback Ryan Hewitt.

A mere 112 years after the game considered the first Rose Bowl was played in a park elsewhere in Pasadena, Stanford and Michigan State engaged in an old-fashioned slugfest in the venerable stadium that later hosted the BCS title game. Stanford fell to 54-13 over the last five seasons, including four straight appearances in BCS bowl games.
