Sovereignty and Self-Determination: A Theory of International Legitimacy

<u>Abstract</u>: This book develops an interpretation and defense of the ideal of collective self-determination that departs from the prevailing voluntarist and nationalist accounts. After articulating the reasons we have to value self-determination, I consider the relative strength of these considerations alongside other, potentially competing reasons for action, such as those given by violations of human rights and shortfalls from social justice. The central claim of the book is that reasons of self-determination are of sufficient weight to ground certain familiar rights of national sovereignty, even on the part of some states that fail to meet the full demands of global political morality. While my proposal would accord self-determining societies a significant degree of autonomy over their internal political affairs, I show that this ideal is nevertheless consistent with, and may in fact require, a substantial role for global governance institutions in a number of key domains.
