The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 ("Recovery Act") was signed into law by President Obama on February 17, 2009. The Recovery Act awards \$1 billion in CDBG Recovery (CDBG-R) funds to be distributed to cities, counties, insular areas and states, of which \$10 million has been reserved by HUD for its administrative costs and \$10 million of which will be awarded to Indian tribes. Recipients of the remaining \$980 million of CDBG-R funds will be the approximately 1,200 jurisdictions that received CDBG funding in Fiscal Year 2008. This template sets forth the suggested format for grantees receiving funds from CDBG-R. A complete submission contains the information requested below, including:

- 1. The CDBG-R Substantial Amendment (template attached below)
- 2. Spreadsheet for Reporting Proposed CDBG-R Activities (see http://www.hud.gov/recovery)
- 3. Signed and Dated Certifications (see http://www.hud.gov/recovery)

#### **ENSURING RESPONSIBLE SPENDING OF RECOVERY ACT FUNDS**

Funding available under the Recovery Act has clear purposes – to stimulate the economy through measures that modernize the Nation's infrastructure, improve energy efficiency, and expand educational opportunities and access to health care. HUD strongly urges grantees to use CDBG-R funds for hard development costs associated with infrastructure activities that provide basic services to residents or activities that

promote energy efficiency and conservation through rehabilitation or retrofitting of existing buildings. While the full range of CDBG activities is available to grantees, the Department strongly suggests that grantees incorporate consideration of the public perception of the intent of the Recovery Act in identifying and selecting projects for CDBG-R funding.

#### A. SPREADSHEET FOR REPORTING PROPOSED CDBG-R ACTIVITIES

Grantees must provide information concerning CDBG-R assisted activities in an electronic spreadsheet provided by HUD. The information that must be reported in the spreadsheet includes activity name, activity description, CDBG-R dollar amount budgeted, eligibility category, national objective citation, additional Recovery Act funds for the activity received from other programs, and total activity budget. In addition to the Spreadsheet for Reporting Proposed CDBG-R Activities, grantees must provide a narrative for each activity describing how the use of the grantee's CDBG-R funds will meet the requirements of Title XII of Division A and Section 1602 of ARRA. The grantee's narrative must also state how CDBG-R funds will be used in a manner that maximizes job creation and economic benefit in relation to the CDBG-R funds obligated, and will address the Recovery Act, by:

- Preserving and creating jobs and promoting economic recovery;
- Assisting those most impacted by the recession;
- Providing investment needed to increase economic efficiency;
- Investing in transportation, environmental protection, or other infrastructure that will provide long-term economic benefits;
- Minimizing or avoiding reductions in essential services; or
- Fostering energy independence.

The City of Berkeley proposes to use its CDBG-R funding allocation to create and preserve jobs in the construction sector by funding three projects: one public facilities and improvements project, one parks/recreational facilities rehabilitation project, and one housing rehabilitation project. All proposed projects serve low-income Berkeley residents highly impacted by the recession, and are either located in the City's low-income census tracts in West and South Berkeley, or serve low-income residents or clients:

- The HHS Public Health Clinic (830 University Avenue) exclusively serves low-income Berkeley residents and is located in West Berkeley, close to public transportation. This clinic requires over \$482,000 to fund building improvements including ADA accessibility upgrades, the replacement of the roof, interior walls and floors, the heater, and seismic upgrades. An additional \$50,000 in funding will be used for insulation to promote energy efficiency.
- The MLK Recreation Center(1730 Oregon Street), located in Grove Park, serves the low-income neighborhood surrounding it in South Berkeley. CDBG-R funding in the amount of \$30,000 will be added to an existing CDBG allocation of \$85,500 to replace the roof at this facility.
- Amistad House (2050 Delaware Street) is a 59-unit affordable senior housing development. Rehabilitation to this facility will include upgrades to life-safety systems, energy efficiency improvements including the replacement of windows and doors, and other interior and exterior renovations.

If any of the above projects are not ready to move forward within the prescribed time period, the following projects are proposed for use of CDBG-R funds:

- The HHS Mental Health Clinic (2640 Martin Luther King Jr. Way) located in South Berkeley, requires an upgrade of its electrical systems. This clinic serves severely mentally ill Berkeley residents, some of whom are homeless.
- The West (1900 Sixth Street) and South (2929 Ellis Street) Berkeley Senior Centers are located in the target low-income census tracts in South and West Berkeley. Both require a substantial upgrade of their fire alarm systems.
- Erna P. Harris Court (1330 University Avenue) consists of 35 units of supportive housing for homeless and disabled single adults. Rehabilitation

will include replacement of the drainage system, bathroom and kitchen upgrades, window replacements, flooring replacements, accessibility improvements and green building upgrades.

Investments in these public facilities and housing projects will provide long-term benefits to low-income Berkeley residents seeking health care and senior services and affordable housing. Rehabilitation work planned as part of four of the seven projects will promote energy savings.

The City of Berkeley will utilize \$58,648 (under 7%) of the total allocation for administration of the projects.

It is estimated that at least 9 time-limited construction jobs would be created or retained through the use of CDBG-R funding for the above-mentioned projects.

Several activities proposed for funding with CDBG-R will promote energy conservation and incorporate green building technologies. The Public Health Clinic rehabilitation will include improvements to the building envelope by replacing windows and installing insulation in the building. The MLK Recreation Center roof will be replaced with a white roof to promote energy efficiency. The rehabilitation at Amistad House and Erna P. Harris Court will incorporate energy efficiency measures including replacement of windows and doors and upgrading bathrooms with water-saving appliance replacements.

#### C. PUBLIC COMMENT

#### Response:

The City of Berkeley held two public hearings on the use of CDBG-R funds: one on April 2, 2009 before the Housing Advisory Commission (published in the *Berkeley* 

Daily Planet on March 26, 2009) and one on April 21, 2009 before the Berkeley City Council (published in the *Daily Californian* on April 2, 2009). Five people spoke at the April 2, 2009 public hearing before the HAC and one person spoke at the April 21, 2009 public hearing before City Council. Speakers emphasized the needs of the disabled and seniors to access affordable housing and accessibility improvements. Two speakers spoke in favor of funding improvements at the Public Health Clinic. Other speakers emphasized the need for rehabilitation of long-term affordable rental and owner-occupied housing.

The CDBG-R Substantial Amendment was also published to the City of Berkeley's website on May 28, 2009. Comments received prior to submission to HUD included:
