

Chair Bernstein made end-of-term remarks, and commissioners thanked and complimented the Chair for her leadership in 2015.

7. CHIEF OF POLICE'S REPORT

- -- The tragic accidental death of a city refuse worker on Monday is being investigated by BPD and CalOSHA.
- -- Reminder: MLK Day breakfast Monday at 8:00 a.m. at Hs Lordship's.
- -- BPD is working on year-end crime numbers.
- -- BPD has hired a fiscal manager whose only job is to work on the budget; currently working on the mid-year budget.
- -- A recruitment just closed; testing starts month. 7 officers in FTO and 4 going to academy.

Questions:

-- Details about the Council agenda item for spending \$500,000 on BPD fleet vehicles? Each year, BPD funds go into the Public Works budget for replacing fleet

cars; this occurs on a regular schedule. The funds are already in the BPD's budget. Unsure of the exact number of fleet vehicles.

- -- When will data analysis from CPE be moving forward? Still collecting and analyzing, and won't have an update until February.
- -- What constitutes blocking the sidewalk? Would need to consult with city attorney.
- -- Beat analysis? 4 6 months, per Lt. Montgomery at the last meeting.
- -- Regarding enforcement of Penal Code 647(e) (referencing Training & Info Bulletin #220) the low priority referenced is priority whose policy? City Council per Res. 61,042 N.S.
- -- Preparing anything in budget to carry out recommendations post-incident report re Dec. 2014 protests? Yes; among the items are body-worn cameras, body armor, crowd management training.
- -- Interest in a cost analysis to carry out the recommendations.



Appointments of Members of the Public to PRC Subcommittees

(Item #10.a. of January 27, 2016 agenda.)

Commmissioners will consider establishing a formal process for appointing members of the public to Police Review Commission subcommittees, and codifying such a process into the PRC Standing Rules. Staff has prepared this memo, which includes proposed language, to assist you in your deliberations.

RELEVANT LAW AND CITY POLICY

PRC ENABLING ORDINANCE (B.M.C. Chapter 3.32)

Section 3.32.070.F.

The commission may appoint such subcommittees as are deemed necessary or desirable for the purposes of this ordinance, provided that, membership on such subcommittees shall not be limited to the Commission members but may include members of the public who express an interest in the business of the subcommittees. The members of such subcommittees shall serve without compensation.

COMMISSIONERS' MANUAL

Chapter II. SERVING ON A COMMISSION

- C. Commission Organization
 - 3) Duties of Officers

The chairperson, or in her/his absence, the vice chairperson, performs the following duties:

 Appoints commission members to temporary subcommittees and informal bodies subject to the approval of the full commission.

PROPOSED LANGUAGE

In consideration of the above, staff offers the following draft language for your discussion. (Sentences are numbered for purposes of discussion only.)

APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC TO PRC SUBCOMMITTEES

- 1. In accordance with the PRC Ordinance, the chairperson may appoint members of the public to subcommittees in which they have expressed an interest, subject to approval of the commission.
- 2. Members of the public seeking to serve on a subcommittee must present themselves at a commission meeting before or at the time of the appointment.
- 3. Members of the public appointed to subcommittees shall enjoy the same voting rights and privileges on the subcommittee, as that of PRC commissioners appointed to the subcommittee, except that public members may not be selected to be the subcommittee chair.
- 4. Commission members must constitute a majority of the membership of any subcommittee, but a subcommittee may convene and conduct business even if commissioners are not a majority of subcommittee members present.
- 5. The term of appointment for members of the public appointed to subcommittees shall not exceed the life of the subcommittee.
- 6. If a subcommittee must be reauthorized, any members of the public serving on the subcommittee must be reappointed by the chairperson, subject to the approval of the commission.
- 7. A public member of a subcommittee who is absent from three consecutive subcommittee meetings is automatically removed from the subcommittee, but may be resinstated by the chairperson if good cause for the absences is shown.
- 8. The chairperson, subject to the approval of the commission, may remove a member of the public from a subcommittee for good cause. Examples of good cause are: failure to work cooperatively with subcommittee members; unruly or disruptive behavior at meetings; or failure to participate in the work of the subcommittee.
- 9. All actions by the chairperson to appoint, reappoint, or remove a member of a public to or from a subcommittee shall occur at a commission meeting,

Commissioners

I want to thank you very much for the time you extended me at last night's meeting. Your professional courtesy and respect was a welcome change from speaking with an intolerant City Council.

I was especially pleased that Commissioner Lipman was able to place Liberty City on the next agenda. It is my impression that you will be examining primarily the process employed in deciding to evict this intentional community. As a by-product It's my desire you also examine the overall policy governing enforcement of California Penal Code 647(e)

In order to conduct a through investigation I suggest as a starting point an examination of the law itself.

California Penal Code 647(e) states:

Except as provided in subdivision (1), every person who commits any of the following acts is guilty of disorderly conduct, a misdemeanor:

(e) Who lodges in any building, structure, vehicle, or place, whether public or private, without the permission of the owner or person entitled to the possession or in control of it.

No where within the statute is defined two specific terms which form the foundation of the law Those terms are

- 1.) Lodging
- 2.) Public (property).

This lack of definition established a prima facie case that the law is vague in violation of the United States Constitution.

Setting that aside let us move forward and independently define these two crucial terms.

1.) Lodge

Websters (http://www.merriam-webster.com/dictionary/lodge) provides a detailed definition of this term. I call attention to the following:

Intransitive verb

1a: to occupy a place temporarily: sleep

b: to have a residence: dwell

(2): to be a lodger

No where is there provided a direct example of this term such as the use of a tent etc. In fact every single person who falls asleep in a public space is in violation of 647(e). For instance. It's been a long day and you fall asleep at the bus bench. Bang you can be cited for violation. Since the police do not take action against bus stop sleeping, (which happens a lot) but do so against homeless people resting, enforcement of 647(e) is a violation of the United States Constitution. (equal protection).

Public (Property)

Blacks Law dictionary (http://thelawdictionary.org/public-property) defines public property as Any property that is not owned by a private individual or a company. It belongs to the public at large and not to any one person. It covers premises and facilities that are owned by the government or a community.

It is notable that this definition does not bestow any decision making process on any single individual. By practice a representative democracy affords this process on a single person or persons. The public though does not surrender any ownership interests. In order to enforce 647(e) the City must first declare homeless people as no longer being members of the public. They would have to codify homeless people as a separate class for example aliens from ogah bogah. Since no such class exists homeless people retain their status as members of the public. Thus we award ourselves the right to occupy any public property whether it be the front lawn of city hall or a park because we own it as members of the public.

Our examination leads us to the reasonable conclusion that the law in question (as written) is vague and can not be applied to "public property"

I respectfully call attention to a third point. In the event you decide the first two points as having no merit. It is the unique characteristics of Liberty City you can not dismiss.

Liberty City began as a community response to several laws being considered by City Council. The Community concluded these laws unfairly targeted homeless people. They organized and intiated a public demonstration/assembly to petition the government for a redress of grievances. From there homeless people decided to continue the assembly. There is no question that the central purpose of Liberty City was a free speech activity protected by the First Amendment. The Government may not like a bunch of uppity homeless protesting but it does not get to decide the place,manner or times that we may do so. Exception being if the activity rises to the level of screaming fire in a crowded theater when no such threat exists. At no time did Liberty City rise to that standard.

Our inquiry leads us to three determinations

- 1.) The law in itself is vague and thus unenforceable
- 2.) The law can not be applied to public property. If activity(ie drug dealing,) is being conducted on public property which concerns elected representatives they must find another method to resolve that concern
- 3.) The law can not be applied to Constitutionally protected activity.

Policy

Obviously a serious effort to reform current must be made. Failure to do so leaves City Council in a tenuous position, vulnerable to litigation. If such litigation does materialize, (and most likely it will) the City will have to expend unbudgeted resources to resolve the matter. At this time I would like to propose the following changes.

1.) The time frame mentioned be stricken and that it simply state enforcement of 647(e) is a low priority in absence of other issues.

- 2.). Enforcement of 647(e) is not applicable to any City owned property no matter what shape or form it takes. If it is owned by the City it is owned by the public.
- 3.) Enforcement of 647(e) is not applicable to clearly identified activities whose sole purpose is to exercise the rights defined by the first amendment.

Alternative Responses

In the event that reliance on 647(e) is not appropriate(either in whole or part) in an attempt to remove person or persons from a publicly owned area the following shall apply.

Public Health

- 1.) The person or persons occupying the area shall be notified in writing that a condition exists that endangers public health.
- 1.) This notice shall only be issued by health department
- 2.) Shall allow for correction by person or persons occupying the area in a reasonable time defined as no less then 72 hours
- 3.) Upon failure by the person or persons occupying the area to correct the issue the Public health must take reasonable steps to do so. None of these steps are to be the physical removal of person or persons from the area.
- 4.) If Public Health concerns persist (a second proven incident) Health Department is then free to evacuate the area after issue of a written notice of such evacuation. A reasonable time of no less then 72 hours shall be provided.

Violence - Anti Social Behavior

- 1.) Any instances of violence and or anti-social behavior shall be initially dealt with internally. BPD may only respond upon request by person or persons occupying the area.
- 2.) A second incident shall result in a direct response by BPD. Public Safety becomes the controlling factor trumping any other concerns

The central point of future policy is those engaged in complained about behavior be given the opportunity to correct.

Additionally it needs to be made clear that all responsibility for enforcement or non-enforcement of 647(e) starts and ends with BPD. City officials may make the initial complaint but then their involvement ends







our block captain, explained that the Santa Rosa Avenue Neighborhood Watch group was formed in 1983 with 8 homes. Now we are up to 37 homes on the same state of the same stat

- --We are apolitical -- we are really only focused on crime watch and disaster preparedness, not on political issues.
- --We don't promote businesses. That being said, if someone asks for a recommendation (e.g. gardener, contractor, etc.), we can share recommendations.
- -We don't give out our block contact list please keep it private.

One neighbor suggested taking photos of our neighbors to add to the contact list.

Our guest speakers were Lieutenant Andrew Rateaven, Officer Victor Mantinez, and Office Rich Manin

Lieutenant Rateaver is our area commander; he expressed wanting to hear our concerns and feedback. He gave an example of the importance of being good samaritans — a child was recently spotted wandering in traffic (alone) in the very early morning in the downtown Berkeley area. A citizen kept an eye on child and gave a call. By taking the time and caring enough to call, we can all help each other and help the police do a better job.

Officer Martinez passed out handouts and a business card for our area coordinator, Officer Brandon Smith who can be reached at (510) 981-5773 or bcsmith@CityofBerkeley.info. He talked about how, recently, the flat lands have been inundated with residential burglaries. There have been 173 cases so far in 2015 of residential burglaries, up about 100 from last year. The police force is down from 18 beat cops to 14.

If you see something suspicious, give a call to the police department. Be specific about why the person's behavior is suspicious (e.g., they are looking in car or house windows, walking up and down driveways, etc).

If there is an immediacy of a threat/emergency (e.g., someone is breaking down a door), call 911 from a land line or 510-981-5911 from a cell phone. If you are witnessing suspicious behavior but there is no crime in progress (non-emergency situation), call 510-981-5900 to report it. If possible, it is a good idea to take a photo of the suspicious person to pass on to the police.

The current crime trends indicate that houses that are commonly being victimized are 1) under construction or renovation and 2) houses that are left unlocked or don't have good security doors or windows.

To make your home less attractive to criminals, you can:

- -Get a house alarm
- --Get a dog (or make it look like you have a dog by leaving around a leash, dog bowl, "beware of dog" sign)
 - -Install good lighting systems
- -- Ensure your house doors and windows are locked
- -Do not leave valuables in sight of a window (draw shades if you have them)
- #-Install a surveillance camera
- --Don't leave valuables including laptops, ipads, phones, etc. out where they are visible
- -- Use deadbolt locks and install extra latches for easy-to-open windows

Most residential burglaries happen during business hours. Cops are trying to do surveillance on the targeted areas but criminals see cops coming because of the marked cars and uniforms. The police have been dealing with a lot of people with substance-abuse and mental-health issues.

The police advised that you should not confront a burglar. If you come home and discover that someone is in your house, leave immediately and call 911. If you are in the house when someone enters, barricade yourself in a room and call 911.

If someone you do not know knocks on your door, do not open the door. It is better to say that you are home and not interested than to pretend that you are not home. (A criminal who knocks and does not get an answer may go around the back to attempt to enter/kick in the door.) A person would require a permit to do door-to-door solicitation in Berkeley. Also, if you are concerned about someone (e.g. a PG&E employee) really being who they say they are, ask (through a closed door) to call their supervisor and confirm that they are who they say are and that they are supposed to be at your address.

One tip is to store your valuables in the kitchen cabinets; burglars don't often look there.

Note: if you have a false alarm with your alarm system, be sure to call your alarm provider right away and even call police to let them know that it is a false alarm. Having police come out to check on false alarms is a waste of police resources.

In the past, police used to come out to your home and inspect for vulnerable areas. Lieutenant Rateaver said that this (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) is not officially done by the police department anymore, but we could contact Officer Brandon Smith (our area coordinator) on an individual basis to ask him if it would be possible to set up an appointment to do this.

A neighbor asked if we could use the money from our dues to invest in a surveillance camera system for the block.

People asked about safety of BART parking lots – the police indicated that you should park in the well-lit BART parking lots. (For the North Berkeley BART station, if you are coming back at night, they recommended not parking in the lot along Virginia/Acton/Franklin Streets.) If walking around at night, stay alert and don't walk around buried in your phone. It's always good to know what's going on around you.

A neighbor asked if you are supposed to report fake IRS calls or other scams to police. These calls are often not local and may even be coming from out of the country, so Berkeley police can't do anything about it. 

On several occasions in the recent past, the Church was the victim of serious vandalism, in which the security was compromised, potentially allowing trespassers and other criminals access to the premises. Of course, this caused great concern to the Pastor, and to me. Officer Kaplan was the one who responded first on both these occasions. He was extremely helpful, very polite, and offered several good suggestions. He even helped to physically secure the property, fixing much of the damage these vandals had inflicted. Officer Kaplan answered all of our questions. He was a skilled communicator. Even more important, he showed a genuine concern for not only the Pastor and myself, but for the welfare of our entire congregation. He was clearly concerned for our safety and well-being.

In a more recent incident, which was by far the most serious event, there was an actual burglary, in which numerous items were stolen and some damage was caused to the Church itself. Without his calming and reassuring presence, it would have been extremely difficult to function at all, under these severely trying circumstances.

I know that Officer Kaplan, in the normal course of his police duties, regularly responds to incidents and crises which may involve crimes of violence, personal injuries, and even fatalities. In light of this reality, I find it admirable and extremely gratifying that Officer Kaplan did not try

to minimize the seriousness of our situation, or say or do anything to make us feel like our problem was unimportant, or that we were somehow wasting his time.





Around 9:15pm, an incident occurred involving a friend of mine and several Berkeley police officers. Fortunately, all officers on the scene were highly professional, understanding, and demonstrated what I can only call a super-human ability to diffuse a potentially awful situation in such a way that would make police officers across the country proud. And Her respective citizens, despite many holding/professing "anti-police" politics, would have had to accept and acknowledge these brave officers as professional, selfless, and indispensable, to say the least.

After the officers on scene CLEARLY established authority on a busy street corner largely populated by young barkeepers like my group, they kept the situation from escalating (which truly shocked me given the amount my friends had drank), dealt with it in a most appropriate fashion, and left the scene after seeing that the situation was extinguished properly. Furthermore, the officers also quite courteous to our group before departing.

Unfortunately, I failed to get the name/badge numbers of the officers on scene. I was the only completely sober member of our group, and for whatever reason, I feared asking for an officer's name/badge number might come off the wrong way to them and further stress an already volatile situation. So, I am unable to give credit where credit is due, but would still really like to do so.

So once again, it occurred between roughly 9:10pm and 9:30pm near Cafe Durant and I believe it had to do with an open alcohol container (22 year old male pedestrian). There were at least two male officers on bicycles who arrived after one male and one female officer in a marked police vehicle had stopped said individual. I was very impressed by these officers' handling of the situation and, though they have bigger fish to fry, I hope that this token of gratitude and praise reaches them.


