

#### 5. CHIEF OF POLICE'S REPORT

Capt. Greenwood reported on behalf of Chief Meehan:

- -- The budget is balanced this fiscal year but probably won't be the FY after that.
- -- Currently 169 sworn officers. Sending several to academy mid-summer.
- -- [Responding to a public commenter:] Pretty sure mobile crisis team has a number they give to consumers, so they can be reached directly. Re training: issue with CIT is access to spots in the 40-hour class. Ofc. Shannon always has a pool of officers ready to go to when spots open up. Shorter training in order to get everyone exposed. About 30% of dispatchers have attended a 2-day CIT training, and more will be sent as spots are available.

Questions/Remarks

- -- Thanks to the Chief for memo answering PRC's questions [4/4/16 memo; p. 23 of packet]. Also applaud BPD taking advantage of procedural justice training.
- -- [Responding to several comment/questions:] Yes, there has been a collapse in our mental health system; a huge issue for everyone, not just police. BPD is continuing to respond to calls and doing their part making it safe. Trying to have as many officers as possible trained, so they can handle properly, but they are not care providers. City's Mental Health division will be adding staff, which will increase Mobile Crisis Team operating hours, but not sure it will be 24-hour coverage.

#### 1 **Proposed Berkeley Police Department General Order:** 2 **Body Worn Cameras** 3 **450.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE** 4 This policy provides guidelines for the use of portable audio/video recording devices, or Body Worn 5 Cameras (BWC) by members of this department while in the performance of their duties. This policy 6 covers all recording systems whether body-worn, hand held or otherwise. 7 This policy does not apply to lawful surreptitious audio/video recording, interception of communications 8 for authorized investigative purposes). 9 **450.2 POLICY** 10 The Berkeley Police Department recognizes that video recording of contacts between Department 11 personnel and the public provides an objective record of these events, and that the use of a recording 12 system complements field personnel in the performance of their duties by providing a video record of 13 enforcement and investigative field contacts, which can enhance criminal prosecutions, limit civil 14 liability, increase transparency, and enhance professionalism in policing. A video recording of an event 15 or contact also enables the delivery of timely, relevant, and appropriate training to maximize safety for 16 both community members and BPD personnel and will improve the delivery of police services to the 17 community. 18 While recordings obtained from video recorders provide an objective record of events, it is understood 19 that video recordings do not necessarily capture all events, activities and information, or reflect the full 20 experience of the individual member(s) in a given incident. Moreover, the recordings, especially video, 21 have limitations and may depict events differently than the events recalled by the involved member. 22 Specifically, it is understood that the recording device will capture information that may not have been 23 heard and/or observed by the involved member and that the involved member may see and hear 24 information that may not be captured on video.1 25 450.2a Confidentiality and Proper Use of Recordings. 26 Body Worn Video use is limited to enforcement and investigative activities involving members of the 27 public. The recordings will capture video and audio evidence for use in criminal investigations, 28 administrative reviews, and other proceedings protected by confidentiality laws and Department policy. 29 Officers shall comply with all applicable laws and policies regarding confidential information. 30 Unauthorized use or release of BWC recordings may compromise ongoing criminal and administrative 31 investigations or violate the privacy rights of those recorded. 32 33 Any unauthorized use or release of recordings or other violation of confidentiality laws or Department 34 policies are considered serious misconduct and subject to disciplinary action. 35 36 450.2b Training Required. 37 Officers who are assigned BWC's must complete department-approved training in the proper use and 38 maintenance of the devices before deploying to the field.

As part of a continual improvement process, regular review should be conducted by BPD staff of the training on this policy and the related use of BWC's under this policy. BPD shall develop a training curriculum that shall be reviewed by the PRC periodically.<sup>2</sup>

#### **450.3 MEMBER PRIVACY EXPECTATION**

All recordings made by members acting in their official capacity shall remain the property of the Department. Members shall have no expectation of privacy or ownership interest in the content of these recordings.

#### **450.4 MEMBER RESPONSIBILITIES**

- Prior to going into service, each member who is assigned to wear a BW will be responsible for making sure that he or she is equipped with a portable recorder issued by the Department, and that the recorder is in good working order. If the recorder is not in working order or malfunctions at any time, the member shall promptly report the failure to his/her supervisor and obtain a functioning device as soon as practicable. Uniformed members should wear the recorder in a conspicuous manner or otherwise notify persons that they are being recorded, whenever possible.
- Officers are not required to obtain consent to record from members of the public when the officer is lawfully at the location where the recording takes place.
- Upon the approval of the patice thief or his order designee non-uniformed members may use an approved portable recorder. Unless conducting a lawful recording in an authorized undercover capacity, non-uniformed members should wear the recorder in a conspicuous manner when in use and notify persons that they are being recorded whenever possible.
- When using a portable recorder, the assigned member shall record his or her name, BPD identification number and the current date and time at the beginning and the end of the shift or other period of use, regardless of whether any activity was recorded. This procedure is not required if the recording device and related software captures the user's unique identification and the date and time of each recording.
  - Members are required to document the existence of a recording in any report or other official record of the contact, including any instance where the recorder malfunctioned or the member deactivated the recording. In the event activity outlined in section 450.5 is not captured in whole or in part the member will need to document this and the reason the footage was not captured.

#### **450.4.1 SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES**

Supervisors-shall take immediate physical custody of a BWC when the device may have captured an incident involving a use of force, an officer-involved shooting or death or other serious incident, and shall ensure the data is uploaded in a timely manner as prescribed by BPD policy.(Penal Code § 832.18).

Supervisors shall also review relevant BWC recordings prior to submitting any administrative reports.

Members shall activate the recorder as required by this policy or at any time the member believes it would be appropriate or valuable to record an incident within the limits of privacy described herein.

The BWC shall be activated in any of the following situations:

(a) All enforcement and investigative contacts including stops and field interview (FI) situations.

(b) Traffic stops including, but not limited to, traffic violations, stranger motorist assistance and all crime interdiction stops.

(c) Self-initiated activity in which a member would normally notify the Communications Center.

(d) Probation or parole searches.

450.5 ACTIVATION OF THE BWC

(e) Service of a search or arrest warrant.

(f) Any other contact that becomes adversarial after the initial contact in a situation that would not otherwise require recording.

(g) Transporting any detained or arrested person, with the member in case physical proximity to the civilian.

(h) As directed by the police chief or his her designee

#### 450.5.1 ACTIVATION IN CROWD CONTROL SITUATIONS

During crowd control, protest of mass are spincidents members shall use their BWC's consistent with this policy, and when directed by the Incident Commander. The Incident Commander shall document their orders in an appropriate report (e.g. Operations Plan or After Action Report) and provide the orders to all personnel.

BPD General Order C-1, Intelligence Procedures for First Amendment Activities, prohibits intelligence gathering on "political, religious, or social views or activities of individuals or groups, unless such views or activities directly relate to criminal conduct," and applies to the use of BWC's and other recording devices.

#### **450.5.2 DISCRETIONARY ACTIVATION**

Recording is permitted but not required under certain circumstances, including but not limited to the following: <sup>3</sup>

- 1. Members taking a report when the information available to them indicates the suspect is not on the scene.
- 2. During a preliminary investigation with a child abuse victim or a victim of a sexual assault.
- 3. Members meeting with a Confidential Informant.
- 4. Members on guard assignment on police, medical, psychiatric, jail or detention facility. Members shall assess the circumstances (e.g., suspect's demeanor/actions, spontaneous statements, etc.) of each guard assignment, on a continuing trasis, to determine whether to activate or de-activate their recorder.

Members are authorized to use the BWC's to record statements in lieu of taking a written statement. Members shall advise or obtain consent from victims of witnesses when taking a recorded statement. Members shall advise and obtain consent from child abuse or sexual assault victims or their guardians before taking a recorded statement.

Members shall remain sensitive to the dignity of all individuals being recorded and exercise sound discretion to respect privacy by discontinuing recording whenever it reasonably appears to the member that such privacy may outweigh any legit mate law enforcement interest in recording. Requests by members of the public to stop recording should be considered using this same criterion. Recording should resume when privacy is no longer at issue unless the circumstances no longer fit the criteria for recording.

Informal community interactions differ from "consensual encounters" in which officers make in an effort to develop reasonable suspicion to detain or probable cause to arrest. To strengthen relationships between police and citizens, officers may use discretion regarding the recording of informal, non-enforcement related interactions with members of the community, but in no case will recordings be made that are in conflict will the provisions of this policy.

At no time is a member expected to jeopardize his or her safety in order to activate a BWC or change the recording media. However, the BWC should be activated in situations described above as soon as practicable.

#### 450.5.3 SURREPTITIOUS USE OF THE PORTABLE RECORDER

Members of the Department may surreptitiously record any conversation during the course of a criminal investigation in which the member reasonably believes that such a recording will be lawful and beneficial to the investigation.<sup>4</sup>

Members shall not surreptitiously record another department member without a court order unless lawfully authorized by the Chief of Police or the authorized designee.

#### 450.5.4 CESSATION OF RECORDING

Once activated, the BWC should remain on continuously until the member's direct participation in the incident is complete or the situation no longer fits the criteria required herein for activation. Recording may be stopped during significant periods of inactivity such as report writing or other breaks from direct participation in the incident.

Members shall cease audio/video recording whenever necessary to ensure conversations are not recorded between a person in custody and the person's attorney, religious advisor or physician, unless there is explicit consent from all parties to the conversation

#### 450.6 PROHIBITED USE OF PORTABLE RECORDERS

- Members are prohibited from using department-issued portable recorders and recording media for personal use and are prohibited from making personal copies of recordings created while on duty or
- while acting in their official capacity.
- Members are also prohibited from retaining recordings of activities or information obtained while on duty. Members shall not duplicate or distribute such recordings, except for authorized legitimate department business purposes. All such recordings shall be relained at the Department.
- 179 Members are prohibited from using personally owner devices for video recording while on duty-6
- 180 Recordings shall not be used by any preraber for the purpose of embarrassment, intimidation or ridicule.

#### 450.7 PROCESSING AND HANDLING OF RECORDINGS

Any time a member records any partion of a contact that the member reasonably believes constitutes evidence in a criminal case, the member shall record the related case number and transfer the file in accordance with current procedure for storing digital files and document the existence of the recording in the related case report. Transfers must occur at the end of the member's shift, or any time the storage capacity of the recorder is rearing its limit. In circumstances when the officer cannot complete this task, the officer's supervisor shall immediately take custody of the portable recorder and be responsible for uploading the data. Officers must properly categorize and tag video recordings any time they are uploaded.

- Any time a member reasonably believes a recorded contact may be beneficial in a non-criminal matter
- 192 (e.g., a hostile contact), the member should promptly notify a supervisor of the existence of the
- recording and document the contact appropriately.
- 194 Members are prohibited from intentionally erasing, altering, reusing, modifying, or tampering with
- audio video recordings.—Findings that a member intentionally or repeatedly destroyed or did not
- 196 capture required video recordings will result in disciplinary action.

#### **450.7.1 RETENTION REQUIREMENTS**

- This policy requires that all video and audio recordings from BPD body cameras be retained for two years and one month (twenty-five months), prior to being erased deleted, destroyed, or recycled with the following exceptions: 7
  - a) If evidence that may be relevant to a criminal prosecution is obtained from a recording made by a body-worn camera under this section, BPD shall retain the recording in the same manner as is required by law for other evidence that may be relevant to a criminal prosecution.
  - b) Recording caused by either testing or accidental activation may be deleted after 60 days.

#### 450.7.2 REVIEW OF RECORDINGS BY A MEMBER

When preparing written reports, members should review their exordings as a resource, except as stated in subsections A, B, and C below. However, members shall not retain personal copies of recordings. Members shall not use the fact that a recording was made as a reason to write a less detailed report.

A. Incidents that involve use of force,

A member involved in a use of force shall not review or receive an accounting of any related body camera video for tage prior to completing any required initial reports and statements regarding the recorded event. An involved member will be given the opportunity to supplement fits or her statement in a separate document asseparate section of the report, or in a separate version of the same document if the earlier document(s) can be easily accessed. In no case shall a member alter a report made prior to reviewing the recording.8

B. Incidents that result in grave body injury.

1. In the event of an officer involved incident that results in grave bodily injury, including an officer-involved shooting of an in-custody death, the BWC of the involved member(s) shall be taken from him or the and secured by a supervisor, commander, or appropriate investigator, as necessary. Involved members are not to access or obtain their footage of the incident. It will be the responsibility of the investigation team's supervisor to coordinate with the involved member's supervisor to obtain footage of the incident.

This perspective mirrors policies reviewed by the subcommittee including Los Angeles, Oakland, BART and Richmond.

One commissioner supported also applying the rule in Schedule A to arrests.

226 2. Personnel uploading secured BWC video files shall not view the files unless authorized. 227 3. No member involved in the incident may view any video recordings prior to being interviewed 228 by the appropriate investigative unit and receiving command approval. 229 4. Once a member's report(s) has been submitted and approved and the member has been 230 interviewed by the appropriate investigator, the involved member will have an opportunity to 231 review the recordings prior to the conclusion of the interview process and to provide additional 232 information to supplement his or her statement in a separate document or separate section of 233 the report. In no case shall a member alter a report made prior to reviewing the recording. 234 C. Access by a Member under Investigation 235 1. Criminal - Personnel who are the subject of a criminal investigation may not view any audio/video recordings related to the incident except uson approval, as specified below, by the 236 237 lead investigator or IAB. 238 2. Administrative - In instances where a complaint has been fired and administrative 239 investigations are undertaken and video recognings of the incident exist, the initial interview of 240 the member shall occur before the member has reviewed the recordings. As said in *The Los Angeles Times*, California is the nation's "information black hole" when it comes to police oversight.(1)

Despite the fact that we lead the country on so many progressive issues, we have the highest number of police killings of civilians and some of the worst police transparency laws in the country. (2) And the level of community mistrust in law enforcement is higher than it's been in years. (3)

But a landmark bill (Senate Bill 1286) was just introduced in Sacramento that would be a tremendous step toward improving the relationships and trust between California's communities and peace officers by cracking open police misconduct and use of force records for the public. (4) And we need your help to overcome the powerful law enforcement lobbyists who are doing everything in their power to stop this bill in its tracks and keep their misconduct hidden.
