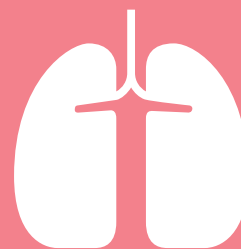

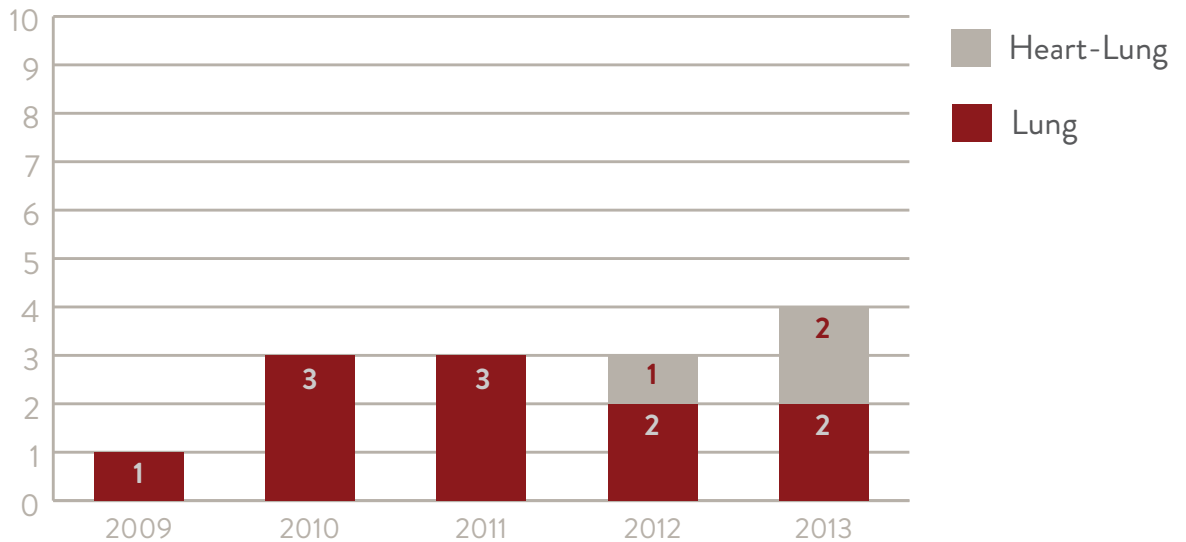

Lung and Heart-Lung Program: Volume & Recipient Age

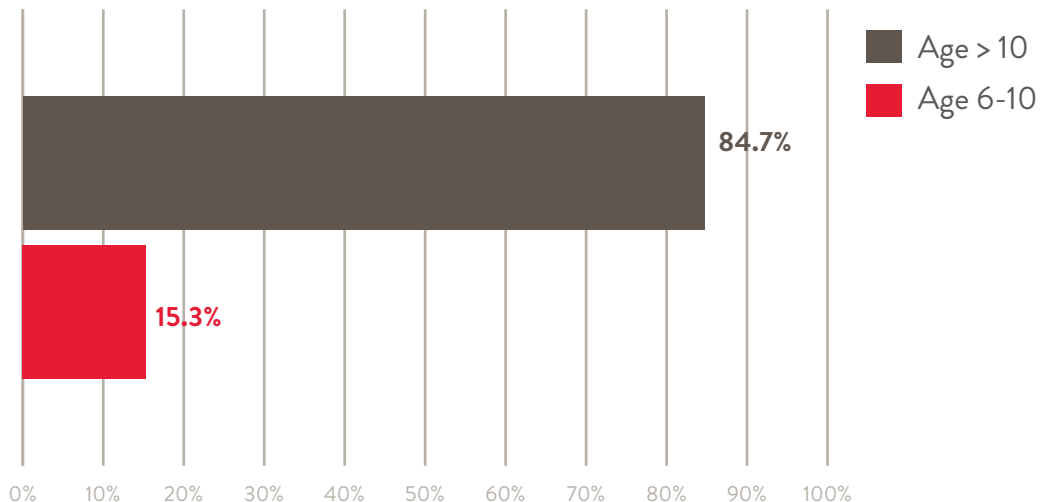
Transplant Volumes

Out of the five total lung and heart-lung transplants that were performed in California during 2013, Lucile Packard Children's Hospital Stanford performed four of them. Only a total of 69 pediatric lung and heart-lung transplants were performed in the U.S. during 2013.



Recipient Age

The majority of our patients needing lung transplants are over the age of 10, but we still see children and babies needing transplant at younger ages.

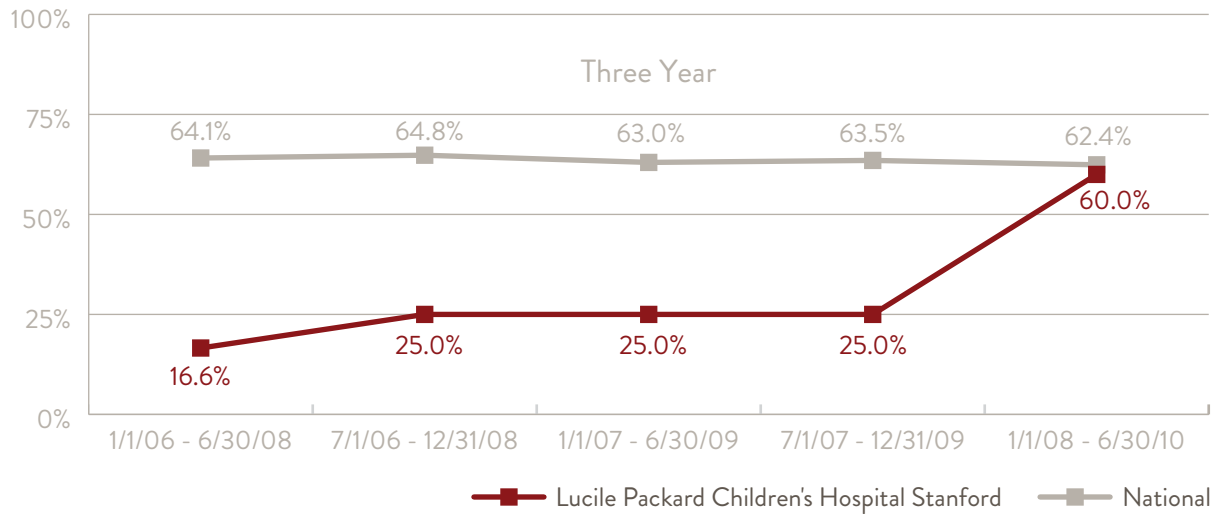
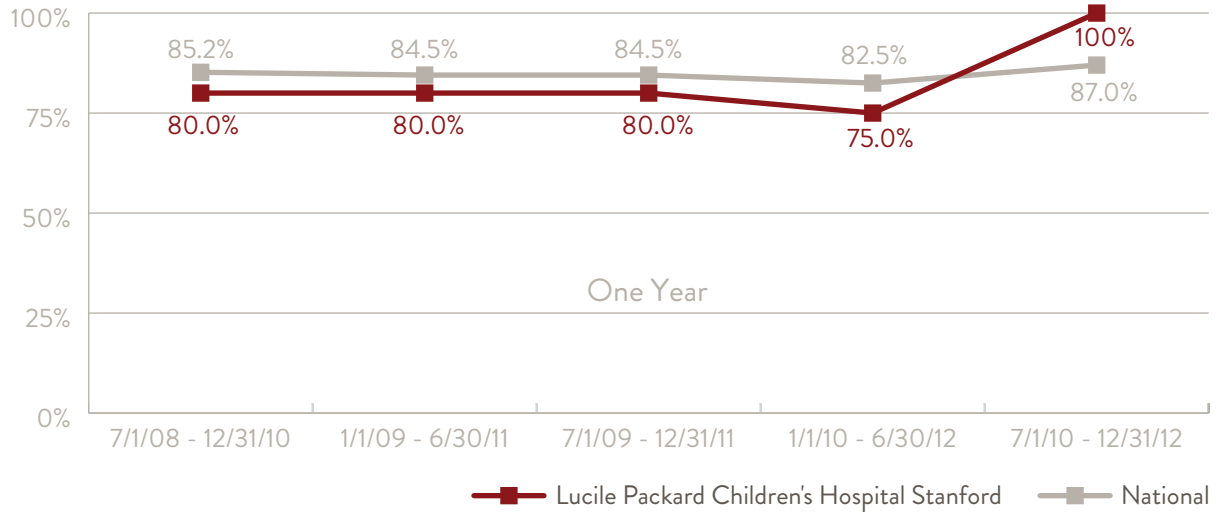
