HOW HOUSING IS ASSIGNED

From the beginning, Stanford University has cultivated a vibrant residential program conducive to research and intellectual dialogue among students and faculty members.

More than 5,900 graduate students live in university housing. Residents enjoy Stanford's active graduate residence program, supportive environment and strong sense of community.

R&DE Student Housing uses a lottery to assign housing to graduate students. You are assigned according to (1) your assignment priority level, (2) the random number assigned to you, and (3) your housing choices.

PRIORITY FOR FIRST YEAR GRADUATE STUDENTS

New Students: Guaranteed First-year Housing

If you are enrolled in a Stanford graduate degree program for the first time, housing is guaranteed for your first year if

- you apply by the Lottery deadline and
- you select “Assign me to any residence for which I am eligible” as your final application choice. Students selecting this choice will not be assigned to Munger or the GSB Residences unless they have specifically listed them. Students may be assigned to any other residence including triple occupancy 2-bedroom apartments and all other off-campus apartments.

Your first-year assignment priority is only effective during your first academic year of graduate study. It cannot be used in later years even if you are admitted to an additional degree program. Students beginning a second graduate degree program are considered continuing graduate students. If you apply after the deadline or have restricted housing choices, you will lose your first-year guarantee but will still be considered for housing before continuing students and students with no priority. Co-terminal students are considered continuing students with a low priority and are not guaranteed housing.

CONTINUING STUDENTS: AFTER YOUR FIRST YEAR

Your ability to renew your housing after the first year is dependent upon your degree program. You must have a medium priority level to renew your housing. (See chart, page 3.)

After the first year, doctoral students are given medium priority. PhD, JSD, and DMA students are given five years of medium priority after their first year, for a total of six years. MD students are given three years of medium priority after their first year, for a total of four years. JD students are given two years of medium priority after their first year, for a total of three years.

Master's students with children have one year of medium priority after their first year, for a total of two years.

The maximum number of priority years a student can have after their first guaranteed year is five. Even students who return to Stanford to obtain additional degrees may not exceed six years of housing priority.

Master's students living in single student or couples housing are given low priority after their first year. Students with low housing priority or no housing priority can apply for housing but cannot renew. They may be assigned after all students with high and medium priority are assigned.

APPLYING FOR GRADUATE HOUSING

Random Lottery Number

The best numbers (lowest numbers) are assigned to students who apply for housing by the Lottery deadline in early May. These numbers are assigned randomly after the May deadline. Students who miss the May deadline will receive a sequential number based on the date the application was submitted. When the assignment system gets to your priority level, it will assign you according to your application number.

Assignment Priority Levels for Graduate Students in Their First Graduate Program at Stanford

When you submit your housing application, the system will display your priority level.

Your assignment priority level is determined by:



1. your student status (new or continuing graduate student),



2. your degree program (PhD, Master's, etc.), and



3. the total number of years you have lived in graduate housing. (See chart, below.)

Chart Legend

G/H = High Priority = Can apply through Lottery

- Students in the first year of their first graduate degree programs at Stanford (does not include co-terminal students) are guaranteed housing (G) if they apply by the Lottery deadline and are willing to accept any assignment.
- First year students who miss the deadline or are not willing to accept any assignment are no longer guaranteed but are given a high priority (H) and are considered for housing before students with lower priority levels.

M = Medium Priority = Can renew if in university housing

- Continuing doctoral students with priority years who have already had a year of high priority
- Master's students applying for a second year of housing, who are living in students with children housing

L = Low Priority = Cannot renew but can apply through Lottery

- Master's students applying for a second year of housing, who are living in single graduate or couples without children housing
- Co-terminal students in the first year of eligibility for graduate housing who have used their four years of undergraduate housing

N = No Priority = Cannot renew but matriculated students can apply through Lottery

- Students who have used their housing priority years
- Non-matriculated students, such as postdoctoral scholars and visiting researchers cannot apply for the Lottery but can apply for housing after the Lottery

In what order are students assigned housing?

1. Student staff and students needing medical accommodations
2. Students with medium priority renewing their housing for the next year
3. Guaranteed new students who applied by the deadline and are willing to live anywhere
4. New students with High Priority in the first year of their graduate degree who limited their housing choices or applied after the Lottery deadline
5. Students with Medium Priority who are not renewing
6. Students with Low Priority

ON-CAMPUS GRADUATE HOUSING CHOICES 2017-2018

Graduate Housing at Stanford accommodates single students and those coming to Stanford with a spouse, domestic partner of any gender, and/or children. All Stanford student housing is smoke-free and pets are not allowed.

Graduate residences include studios and apartments with one to four bedrooms. Information on housing choices available to you can be found on pages 8-9 or at <https://rde.stanford.edu/studenthousing/housing-options>.

Graduate Housing includes 4,800 on-campus spaces and 1,100 off campus spaces that Stanford has leased to meet housing demand. These apartments are located in Menlo Park,

Mountain View, Palo Alto, and Redwood City, and are furnished. They are offered along with on-campus options during the assignment process.

During the application process, you will have the ability to rank all of the residence choices available to students in your housing category (single, couple without children, or student with children). When the program gets to your priority level and Lottery number, it will place you into the highest available residence on your preference list. If all of the residences you have listed are full, you will be assigned by your final choice of “assign me to any residence for which I am eligible” or “assign me only to the residences I have listed”.



Escondido Village/ Escondido South

Escondido Village and Escondido South serve couples, families, and single students in studios, and one- to four-bedroom apartments. These units are located in one- and two-story low-rises, four-story studio apartment buildings, and multi-story apartment towers.



Kennedy Graduate Residences in Escondido Village

The Kennedy Graduate Residences are some of the newest apartments on campus. Apartments include two-bedroom, two-bath, junior studio units with semi-private kitchens for single students, and premium studios available to singles or couples. Each bedroom has a private bathroom.



Rains Houses

Liliore Green Rains Houses, one of Stanford’s largest housing complexes, accommodates single students in two- and four-bedroom apartments located in three-story buildings clustered around lawns and courtyards.



Due to construction in the vicinity of Escondido Village, Escondido South and Rains Houses, parking will be limited. Students who are able to avoid bringing cars to campus are encouraged to do so. New residential alternative transportation programs, including incentives, will be offered to support residents who are able to go car-free. <https://transportation.stanford.edu/transportation-updates-escondido-village-residents>

Apartment Features

- All student housing is furnished
- Window coverings and floor coverings are provided
- Wi Fi service is available in all housing
- Utilities such as water, heat, electricity, garbage, and sewer are included in the housing rates
- Professional and student support staff

“Assign me to any residence for which I am eligible”:

- You must select this as your final choice in order to retain your first year housing guarantee.
- Students selecting this choice will not be assigned to Munger or the GSB Residences unless they have specifically listed them.
- Students may be assigned to any other residence including triple occupancy 2-bedroom apartments and all other off-campus apartments.
- The more options you rank, the more likely you are to be assigned to one of your preferred residences. If the lottery number you receive does not allow you to be assigned to one of the residences you have ranked, the system will wait until the end of the process to assign you to a residence. You will be assigned to one of the residences left over at the end of the process. To avoid this, rank all locations until you have no further preferences.



Munger Graduate Residence

This centrally located complex offers single students and couples the most luxurious apartments on campus. Studios are available to single students and couples, and two- or four-bedroom apartments are available for singles. Each bedroom has a private bathroom.



Lyman

The Richard W. Lyman Graduate Residences are located on the west side of campus, close to the Medical Center and the Science and Engineering Quad. This complex includes two residential buildings, housing single students in two-bedroom apartments. Common areas are located in the central commons building.

“Assign me only to the residences I have listed”:

- You should rank all available residence choices that you would accept.
- You will not be assigned if we cannot assign you to a residence you listed.
- If you select this final choice and are not assigned in the Lottery, you will forfeit your guarantee and all guaranteed students will be assigned ahead of you in subsequent assignment rounds.



GSB Residences

Stanford’s Graduate School of Business (GSB) manages the GSB Residences, located across Serra Street from the GSB. Two buildings offer studio-style apartments with semi-private kitchens, primarily for GSB students. The GSB Residences are not included if you indicate on the housing application that you are willing to be assigned anywhere. Most spaces in the GSB Residences are assigned to first year GSB students.

OFF-CAMPUS GRADUATE HOUSING CHOICES 2017-2018

Off-campus Apartments

Stanford houses graduate students in 24 apartment communities within Menlo Park, Mountain View, Palo Alto, and Redwood City. Each location promotes a sense of community, and is accessible to public transportation (see transportation.stanford.edu/transit) and/or bicycle routes to campus. Most communities are within walking distance of shops and restaurants, and some are on or near a Stanford Marguerite shuttle route. Amenities vary, and may include swimming pools, hot tubs, tennis courts, exercise rooms and rentable community rooms.

Most options for single students are two-bedroom, double occupancy and three-bedroom, triple occupancy apartments that allow students to have their own bedroom in a shared apartment. There are two options where the den has been converted into an additional, private bedroom. Those options are listed as one-bedroom with den and two-bedroom with den, and provide each student with a private bedroom space as well as shared kitchen, living room and bath.

Students looking for the most affordable housing option may want to consider the two-bedroom, triple-occupancy apartments in Oak Creek. In these apartments, one student stays in the smallest bedroom and the other two

students share the master bedroom. These apartments are large enough for three students but do have reduced privacy. Oak Creek is the closest property to campus with the largest concentration of students. Its many social activities lend the complex a resort-like atmosphere.

Options for couples include studio and 1-bedroom apartments.

It is important to note that students assigned to these off-campus complexes are not eligible to sublicense their rooms while away for the summer or for any other extended period of time. Off-campus apartments are included in the final choice of "Assign me to any residence for which I am eligible".

LOOKING FOR OFF-CAMPUS HOUSING ON YOUR OWN

Rental housing is available near Stanford, but the university is located in a highly desirable suburban area in the heart of Silicon Valley. Consequently, off-campus rental rates are relatively high compared to many other regions of the United States. More affordable options can be found if you look a little further from campus.

To check local rental listings accessible only to Stanford students and affiliates, visit R&DE Student Housing's Community Housing website at <http://offcampus.stanford.edu>. You will be directed from there to the rental listings, which are available through the Places4Students web site. You will either need a Stanford email address

to view the rental listings, or you can contact Community Housing with proof of your affiliation for a temporary password.

If you decide to live off campus, plan to arrive at Stanford at least two weeks early so you have the best range of housing choices.

Housing Rates and Contracts

Student housing charges fall below average local area rents. Housing charges, along with house dues and a technology fee, are billed each quarter. If you receive a salary through Stanford Payroll, you can make payments through payroll deduction.

On-Campus Housing

Stanford on-campus housing rates and other fees include furnishings, utilities, phone, internet, coinless/cardless laundry, access to computer clusters, and common rooms such as lounges and game rooms in most complexes. Both academic-year and year-round contracts are available.

Off-Campus Housing

Stanford off-campus rates include furnishings, utilities and access to the amenities within the complex.

TO APPLY

In March of each year, housing rates and application instructions are posted on the R&DE Student Housing website.

Please read through the information carefully before applying. After setting up your SUNet ID—instructions come with your admission mailing—apply online through Axess (<http://axess.stanford.edu>) between April 12, 2017 and the Lottery deadline, May 11, 2017. (See additional dates below.) Because of the time-sensitive nature of the housing application

process, **please set up your SUNet ID immediately after receiving your letter of admission.** Apply for housing in Axess about 48 hours after you sign up for your SUNet ID. First-year students are only guaranteed housing if they apply by the first-round deadline of May 11. Continuing students eligible to renew their apartments must also renew by May 11. MOVING IN

- Check-ins are generally from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. at your Housing Front Desk. Contact your Housing Front Desk if you need to check in earlier than the established move-in dates or outside of posted Front Desk hours: housingfrontdesks.stanford.edu.
- Housing charges will be prorated based on your selected move-in date.
- You may apply to move into housing the summer before starting your program, but keep in mind access to university facilities is not granted until you are an enrolled student.
- Housing for students with children on campus is limited over the summer. Families who request to move in early may be offered temporary housing in off-campus apartments.

DINING OPTIONS

STUDENTS WITH SCHOOL-AGED CHILDREN

The Palo Alto Unified School District (PAUSD) has a reputation as one of the top districts in the United States. As a result, it can be competitive to secure a space in the schools near campus for your child. Priority registration begins in January, so as soon as you know that you will be attending Stanford, you should start the process of enrolling your child. Register at www.pausd.org/registration. Proof of residence is required. If you are guaranteed housing on campus, Housing Assignments can provide you with a letter for the PAUSD that will confirm you are guaranteed an apartment within the district. Please contact studenthousing@stanford.edu to request a verification letter.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What should I do if I or my spouse, partner or child needs a medical accommodation?

If you, your spouse, partner or child have particular housing needs due to a documented disability or medical condition, you may participate in the Medical Accommodation Lottery, which takes place prior to the main Lottery. To participate in this process, you must submit a housing application in Axess and apply for accommodation with the Office of Accessible Education by April 21. <http://studenthousing.stanford.edu/apply/students-disabilities>

What happens to students in a joint or dual degree program?

Students in a joint or dual degree program are assigned according to the degree that offers the most years of priority. For example, if you are a JD/MBA you would be given one guaranteed year plus two years of medium priority. If you are working on two master's degrees, you would be given one guaranteed year only, plus one additional year of low priority.

What happens if I am a master's degree student and am applying for a doctoral program?

As long as you are accepted into your doctoral program by the May 11 Lottery deadline, we will consider you a Doctoral student. Your priority level will depend upon your degree status as of the Lottery deadline.

What if my family status changes (i.e., changing from single student to couple) while I am at Stanford?

If your family status changes, you can apply for housing in your new category. However, your ability to be reassigned will depend on availability. You are not guaranteed a space in the new category of housing. <http://rde.stanford.edu/studenthousing/reassignments-due-change-family-status>

Can priority level policies change while I am at Stanford?

The number of years that students may renew their housing is reviewed annually and may change during your time at Stanford based on housing availability.

What should I do if I want to live with my friends?

When you apply for housing you are able to apply with a group of up to four students. If all group members have the same priority level and are the same gender, they are likely to be kept together. You may wish to consider this when applying with friends. Even if you are assigned to the same residence, you and your friends may not be assigned into the same apartment, as many apartments will have residents renewing and staying in place for the following year. <https://rde.stanford.edu/studenthousing/applying-group-graduate-housing>
