
INTRODUCTION

Dr. Shelley Fisher Fishkin has published "Reflections on Being in the First Class of Women at Yale," the lead essay in Remembering 50: In Celebration of 50 Years of Coeducation at Yale, edited by Jen Huang, Ananya Kachru, and Avery Arena (2020).

Dr. Maxe Crandall's new book *The Nancy Reagan Collection* landed on the New York Public Library's Top 10 Poetry Books of 2020 & LitHub's 65 Favorite Books of 2020. In December, he received a Eureka Commission from Onassis USA for a performance in development.

Dr. Adrian Daub has released his new book What Tech Calls Thinking: An Inquiry into the Intellectual Bedrock of Sillicon Valley to rave reviews, including a starred review from Kirkus and being a New York Times Book Review Editor's Choice.

Dr. Christine Win Wotipka and Xavier Fields ('19) have published "Effect of LGBT antidiscrimination laws on school climate and outcomes for lesbian, gay, and bisexual high school students" in the *Journal of LGBT Youth*. The paper is based in part on Xavier's thesis for which he was awarded the Rosaldo Prize for Best Thesis in 2019.

LOOKING FORWARD

The Program in Feminist, Gender, and Sexuality Studies is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year! Be on the lookout for more news and information regarding our celebration event happening Spring 2021.

Dr. Maxe Crandall is partnering with **Queer Student Resources** on a series titled "Queer Learning." Queer Learning is a weekly art workshop that will take place in the Spring and is open to everyone in the Stanford community!

Dr. Annie Atura Bushnell will be teaching a class titled "Feminist Life-Writing" in Spring 2021. Students will explore feminist rhetorical and aesthetic strategies for confronting issues like trauma, disability, incarceration, motherhood, and friendship through life-writing. Each student will conduct a large-scale research project focused on an author, genre, or theme of their choice. This course counts as a WIM for FGSS majors.

Henry Washington Jr., a Ph.D. candidate in the Program in Modern Thought and Literature and a PhD Minor in Feminist, Gender, and Sexuality Studies will be teaching a class titled "Black Feminist and Trans Theories of the Human" in Spring 2021. Students will develop broad knowledge of Black feminist and trans theories' provocations regarding the intersecting identity categories that organize our world, and will be encouraged to develop their own critical approaches that are attentive to the hegemony of racialized gender and its attendant deathly violences.
